NTA clarifies Abu Dhabi NEET centre issue, says candidates changed city

New Delhi, June 20 (GNS): The National Testing Agency (NTA) on Saturday responded to the controversy surrounding a NEET-UG 2026 candidate from Nagpur who was allotted an examination centre in Abu Dhabi, stating that its web-activity records indicate that the city change was made through the candidate's own registered login during the correction window. However, the agency added that despite the circumstances, it accepted the aspirant's request and processed a change of examination centre.

NTA took to social media 'X' and said, "Reference the issue with regard to allotment of a centre in Abu Dhabi to a candidate in Nagpur, NTA would like to state: Following the re-scheduling of NEET (UG) 2026 to 21 June, the National Testing Agency reopened the examination-city correction window to assist



candidates." The agency highlighted that nearly 3.2 lakh candidates used the correction facility and that more than 99.5 per cent were allotted their preferred examination cities.

Addressing the Abu Dhabi query, the NTA stated, "NTA's web-activity records indicate that the city change in this case was made through the candidate's own registered login during the open correction window, with a consistent single-user access pattern."

The agency further said that it received an informal

request on the evening of June 19 just 48 hours before the examination to shift the centre from Abu Dhabi to Nagpur. "NTA personnel immediately initiated the change and contacted the candidate's father on 19th evening itself to help them complete the formal process," the statement said.

According to the NTA, its records show that the examination centre was changed to Abu Dhabi once using the candidate's credentials and was previewed twice thereafter. "NTA has observed that on 3 occa-

sions, one - the centre was changed to Abu Dhabi using candidate's credentials and twice it was previewed that the centre is Abu Dhabi. Despite that NTA has accorded to aspirant's request and the change of centre was actioned. A "Student-First" Approach: The NTA's priority is that no candidate misses the examination over an administrative doubt," it added. The controversy emerged after Abdullah Talib, a resident of Nagpur, was reportedly allotted an examination centre in Abu Dhabi, United Arab Emirates, for the RE-NEET UG 2026 examination scheduled for June 21.

According to the family, Abdullah had selected Nagpur, Wardha, and Bhandara as his preferred examination cities while filling out the application form. However, when the admit card was issued, it displayed an examination centre in Abu Dhabi instead of any location in Maharashtra.

India-UK FTA To Be Implemented From July 15; 9 Trade Pacts Open Global Markets For Indian Goods: Piyush Goyal

Mumbai, June 20 (GNS): In a comprehensive review of the Narendra Modi-led government's 12-year tenure, Union Minister for Commerce and Industry Piyush Goyal on Saturday announced that the much-anticipated India-United Kingdom (UK) Free Trade Agreement (FTA) is set to be implemented from July 15.

Iran closes Strait of Hormuz again as Israeli strikes kill 16 in Lebanon

Tehran, June 20 (GNS): Iran dealt two quick blows to the interim agreement with the United States on Saturday, angered by Israel's continued attacks in Lebanon, saying it had closed the Strait of Hormuz and also announcing that while its negotiators were going to Switzerland for talks, not much is likely to happen there.

Key mediator Pakistan, meanwhile, said the technical-level talks will begin on Sunday in Burgenstock, Switzerland, with Qatari mediators also participating. In Tehran's first salvo, Iran's joint military command said the strait had been closed, citing the Israeli attacks and US "bad faith" and "clear breach of its commitments" by failing to end the war. Its statement on state television warned that "if the aggression continues, subsequent steps have been planned."

Shortly after that, the state broadcaster announced that Iran's negotiating team was heading to Switzerland "in the coming minutes," a trip that had been originally planned for Friday. Foreign Ministry spokesperson Esmail Baghaei, however, signalled that



little might happen until Iran feels the US is living up to the deal.

"This trip is therefore about demanding that the other side fulfil its obligations," he said, adding that negotiations toward a final agreement will begin only once key commitments are upheld. If they are not, he said, "then the memorandum of understanding as a whole will be jeopardised." In Washington, Vice President JD Vance confirmed on Saturday that the top US negotiators -- Jared Kushner and Steve Witkoff -- were already in Switzerland and have been working through technical details of the anticipated negotiations on Iran's nuclear program. Vance told Fox News that he expects to leave for Switzerland "sometime the

next couple of days" but acknowledged that "it's always a delicate coordination dance." Meanwhile, the global economy braced for more uncertainty. Ships had begun transiting the strait after the interim US-Iran agreement was signed earlier in the week, a milestone that has left plenty of questions unanswered.

Earlier on Saturday, Israeli strikes on southern Lebanon killed at least 16 people, including two children, hours after reports emerged of a ceasefire agreement there. Seven people remained trapped under the rubble after the strikes hit the southern city of Nabatiyeh and nearby villages, Lebanon's National News Agency said.

The death toll in the latest war between Israel and He-

zbollah has now surpassed 4,000, Lebanon's health ministry later announced. Mediators were scrambling to halt the fighting between Israel and the militant Hezbollah group after a heavy exchange on Friday killed at least 47 people in Lebanon and four Israeli soldiers.

An Israeli military official said Hezbollah had fired more than 50 projectiles at Israeli forces in southern Lebanon overnight. The official spoke anonymously in line with regulations. Israel's army said it struck dozens of Hezbollah targets and militants in southern Lebanon, including Hezbollah command centres.

On Friday, the Israeli ambassador to Washington, Yechiel Leiter, said Israel "remains firmly committed to an immediate ceasefire" if Hezbollah honours the agreement and ceases hostilities.

On Saturday, Hezbollah said it had committed to the ceasefire but blamed Israel for violating it several times Friday night. A statement by the group's military wing said it would abide by the ceasefire but would also repel attacks by Israeli troops.

India Targets Edible Oil Self-Reliance Under Rs 10,103 Crore Mission

Much is said about India suffering from hunger, with the country ranking 105th out of 127 nations in the Global Hunger Index. But the truth is that today, a large number of people in India are suffering less from wasting and more from the problem of obesity.

This is why Prime Minister Narendra Modi has appealed to the country's people to reduce their use of edible oils by at least 10 per cent. He has warned that by 2050, 44 crore people in India could be living with obesity, which he described as the root cause of many diseases. Health experts agree that obesity is linked to many serious conditions, including type-2 diabetes, heart disease, cancer, and stroke. In the five years between the National Family Health Surveys of 2015-16 and 2020-21, the share of women with obesity rose from 20.6 to 24 per cent, and among men from 18.9 to 22.9 per cent. In other words, about one-fourth of our population is suffering from obesity.

The problem of obesity is generally associated with lifestyle, including lack of physical activity and high consumption of fat (particularly edible oils), sugar, and salt. In the 1950s and 60s, India's per capita consumption of edible oil was only 3.4 kg per year. Today, it has increased to 19.4 kg. This is much more than the



13 kg per person per year recommended by the World Health Organization, and the Indian Council of Medical Research (ICMR) recommendation of 12 kg.

It is worth noting that India's population increased from 36.1 crore in 1951 to 142.8 crore in 2023. During this period, domestic production of edible oils rose from 13.8 lakh tonnes to 115.7 lakh tonnes.

But this only meets about half of the demand, leading to a sharp rise in imports—from negligible levels in 1951 to 164.7 lakh metric tonnes in 2022-23. When combined with domestic production, total availability of edible oils reached 278.7 lakh metric tonnes in 2022-23. According to my calculations, if national consumption of edible oils stayed within ICMR's recommended limits, the

current level of domestic production would be sufficient to meet most of the demand, and India's import requirement would fall to just about 56.64 lakh metric tonnes. To make the country self-reliant in edible oils and reduce the burden on imports, the Government of India launched the Edible Oil Mission in October 2024. Under this scheme, an expenditure of Rs 10,103 crore will be made, and the production of primary oilseeds has been targeted to increase from 390 lakh tonnes in 2022-23 to 697 lakh tonnes over the next seven years. This is expected to reduce dependence on imports. And if the Prime Minister's appeal to reduce oil consumption is also effective, then imports will decrease even more. At the same time, consumption of inferior oils will also reduce.

Currently, 67.4 per cent of the edible oils produced in India are obtained from different primary oilseeds. Among these, mustard oil accounts for 33 per cent of the total, groundnut oil for 25.4 per cent, and soybean oil for 19 per cent. The rest is made up of 5.1 per cent from coconut, 2.2 per cent from palm, 11 per cent from cotton seeds, 9.8 per cent from rice husk, 3.1 per cent from solvent extraction of oilseeds, and 1.4 per cent from forests and trees.

India's traditional edible oils are considered good for health to a large extent. But due to our dependence on foreign countries, large quantities of other oils—often seen as harmful to health—have become common in the Indian market. Further, GM edible oils are also being imported, violating food safety laws. Over-

all, 57 per cent of India's total consumption of edible oils is fulfilled through imports—59 per cent of which comes from palm oil.

That palm oil is now a major part of our food chain is concerning. It can potentially increase harmful LDL cholesterol due to its high saturated fat content, which increases the risk of heart disease, obesity, and other health problems. But because it is cheap, its import is constantly increasing. While blending mustard oil has been banned in India since 2021, allegations of adulteration regularly surface. In this context, it would also be appropriate to give a rethink on the inclusion of palm oil in the Edible Oil Mission. The advice given by Prime Minister Modi to reduce the use of edible oils in daily food is timely.

US Lawmakers Push Debate Over Dual Citizenship, National Loyalty

Nearly 7 million Americans have sworn allegiance to another country besides the US, data shows. Some might brush off the issue of dual citizenship because it only impacts about 3 per cent of America's population. But compare that with the No. 1 concern of many Americans today: the 11.7 million foreigners who have entered the country and are living there illegally.

Why is the issue of illegal migration so much more of a concern for American political leaders than the issue of swearing an oath of loyalty to a foreign country?

Both were in the news last week, but they were addressed very differently by both politicians and by the mainstream news media.

Congress on Thursday passed President Donald Trump's "One Big Beautiful Bill," which sets aside more than \$170 billion for immigration and border enforcement. However, the new law does not address the issue of dual citizenship. But this took center stage at the White House the same day, when the president greeted Edan Alexander, a dual American-Israeli citizen and soldier in the Israeli military who was held hostage by Hamas after being captured during the Oct. 7, 2023, terrorist attack. Born and raised in New Jersey, the 21-year-old moved to Israel in 2022, where he swore an oath of allegiance to Israel to gain citizenship. He then enlisted in the army and was serving as a staff sergeant when he was captured. He was freed by Hamas in May in an apparent goodwill gesture as part of negotiations to secure a ceasefire. During the White House meeting, no mention was made of the fact that he had never served in the US military to defend America.

Pro-Israel propaganda has extensively used Alexander's US citizenship to fuel anti-Arab sentiments. It asserts that Hamas and Palestinians generally are not just anti-Israel, they are also anti-American. But the real question is, can someone who pledges loyalty and patriotism to a foreign country truly be an American?

As a Palestinian American who served during the Vietnam War, whose brother served in the US Marines and whose father and uncle served during the Second World War fighting the Nazis, why is our loyalty questioned but not Alexander's — a person who has never served America but has served a foreign country?

Ironically, the loyalty of Americans of Arab heritage like myself — and especially those who are Muslim — is often questioned, challenged and even used as a basis to confront our expressions of concern for Israel's war crimes and genocide in the Gaza Strip over the past two years.

Arab and Muslim students protesting Israel's Gaza war on college campuses have been viciously attacked and accused of antisemitism. The US Justice Department has launched efforts to expel them.

Most American politicians prefer to avoid the issue of dual citizenship, but they pounce on false accusations of anti-Americanism by pro-Palestine students.

While pro-Israel propaganda has suppressed public debate over the treachery of a person swearing dual national loyalties, the issue continues to force its way into public debates. In March, Republican Rep. Thomas Massie introduced legislation — the Dual Loyalty Disclosure Act — that, if it were to become law, would require Americans who run for federal office to declare if they have citizenship of a foreign country. "Dual citizens elected to the United States Congress should renounce citizenship in all other countries," said Rep. Massie. "At a minimum, they should disclose their citizenship in other countries and abstain from votes specifically benefiting those countries. If we are going to continue to allow members of Congress to acquire and retain citizenship in other countries, they should at least be required to disclose to voters all countries of which they consider themselves to be citizens." The bill is co-sponsored by, among others, Reps. Andy Biggs, Marjorie Taylor Greene and Clay Higgins, all supporters of Trump who have been vocal about opposing excessive foreign aid to all countries, including Israel, and redirecting those funds to "American needs." Dual citizenship is an issue of patriotism for every nation. Why should people who enjoy citizenship and benefits in one country be able to pledge their loyalty to another country and serve in its military? It is an expression of that person's lack of faith in the country in which they live. It is like having a plan B: just in case things do not go well in one country, they can use their dual citizenship to flee to another country and to be loyal to it instead. Dual citizenship is a political contradiction that challenges the foundation of national loyalty. It should be banned, not just in America but in every country around the world. The issue of dual citizenship has resurfaced in political discussions in the United States, with critics questioning why it receives far less attention than illegal immigration. According to reports, nearly seven million Americans hold citizenship in another country alongside their US citizenship, sparking debates over national loyalty and patriotism.

The discussion intensified after the White House hosted Edan Alexander, a dual American-Israeli citizen and Israeli soldier who was recently released by Hamas after being captured during the October 7, 2023 attack. Critics argued that while his American identity was highlighted publicly, little attention was paid to the fact that he served in a foreign military rather than the US armed forces.

The debate also comes amid growing political focus on immigration enforcement under President Donald Trump. While Congress recently passed Trump's "One Big Beautiful Bill" allocating billions of dollars toward border security and immigration control, the legislation did not address dual citizenship concerns. At the same time, pro-Palestine student protesters in American universities have faced accusations of anti-Americanism and antisemitism, prompting criticism from civil rights advocates.

Republican Congressman Thomas Massie recently introduced the "Dual Loyalty Disclosure Act," which would require federal candidates to disclose any foreign citizenships. Supporters of the bill argue that elected representatives should openly declare foreign allegiances, while opponents view dual citizenship as a personal and legal matter rather than a threat to national loyalty. The debate over dual citizenship reflects a broader conversation in the United States about identity, loyalty, and national priorities. Supporters of tighter restrictions argue that public officials and citizens with foreign affiliations should face greater transparency requirements, especially when issues involving foreign governments arise. They believe national interests must remain the primary consideration for those holding positions of influence. However, critics argue that dual citizenship is a legally recognized status held by millions of Americans for various personal, family, and historical reasons. They say citizenship in another country does not automatically indicate divided loyalty and that military service, political views, or advocacy should be evaluated separately from a person's nationality status. As the US continues debates over immigration, foreign policy, and national security, the question of how to balance individual rights with concerns about allegiance remains a contentious issue. The discussion is likely to continue as lawmakers, communities, and citizens examine what defines patriotism in an increasingly interconnected world.

Railway Staff Shortage, Human Error Raise Safety Concerns

Indian Railways is unequivocally the backbone of the country's transportation network, responsible for carrying millions of passengers and vast quantities of goods every day. As one of the world's largest railway networks, it plays an irreplaceable role in India's economic growth by ensuring cheap mobility for the masses and facilitating the transport of goods vital for trade. Nevertheless, the past few years have seen a worrying shift in priorities—from necessary infrastructural upgrades to glitzy prestige projects.

This shift has eclipsed glaring safety concerns and operational deficits, which have caused many accidents and exposed susceptibilities within the railway system. Reports of rail accidents overwhelm the news, underscoring an escalating crisis. The rise in accidents indicates systemic failures—maintenance neglect, outdated infrastructure, and sluggish uptake of new safety technologies. Notorious crashes starkly illustrate the extent of the issue. The Balasore triple train collision, in Odisha in June 2023, caused 293 fatalities and left more than 1,100 injured. The Commission of Railway Safety (CRS) said in its report that the tragedy happened due to a signalling failure. The North East Express derailment in Bihar's Raghunathpur in October 2023 killed



four people and left 70 injured. It was caused due to a fault in the tracks. That same month, signal failure and human error led to a collision between two passenger trains in Andhra Pradesh, killing 14 people and injuring over 50.

In February last year, a freight train ran without a driver for more than 70 kilometres from Jammu and Kashmir to Punjab, reflecting operational shortcomings. Then in April, a Mumbai local train derailed, affecting Harbour Line services, another reflection of infrastructure failure. These accidents reflect the pressing need for systemic changes in Indian Railways. Firstly, the chronic underfunding of vital infrastructure and safety measures has been a long-standing issue. Safety-related works

in the railways are funded through the Depreciation Reserve Fund (DRF), the Railway Safety Fund (RSF), and the Rashtriya Rail Sanraksha Kosh (RRSK). The DRF, meant for the replacement of assets, has been adversely affected by poor allocations, hindering the modernisation of ageing railway infrastructure. Additionally, the RRSK—a safety fund established in 2017-18—has faced irregular funding, with the 2025-26 allocation being a mere Rs 2,000 crore, far short of what is required to upgrade railway safety.

Another key concern is the delay of the Kavach safety system, the country's automatic train protection system. To date, it has only been deployed to 3,677 Rkm of 68,000 Rkm. Given the rate at which it is pro-

ceeding, implementation to completion will extend beyond 50 years, compromising the ability to gain maximum dividends from this all-important safety innovation in the pre-emption of mishaps.

Moreover, human error and shortage of workforces worsen the situation. As per an RTI reply, about 2.74 lakh posts were vacant in Indian Railways as of June 2023, with over 1.7 of them being safety-sensitive jobs like signaling and track maintenance. The shortage of manpower has led to longer working hours for employees, which increases the chances of errors due to fatigue.

Additionally, the diversion of funds has also increased the inefficiency of the railway network. A Comptroller and Auditor

General (CAG) report submitted in 2022 revealed that railway safety funds were diverted to non-core expenses like foot massagers, crockery, and high-end gadgets. Though the government promises to give importance to modernisation and expansion of infrastructure, the ground situation tells a different story.

Track expansion has been negligible, going up merely by 23 per cent since 1950, while passenger traffic has risen by a whopping 1,344 per cent. Additionally, top priority vanity projects like the Vande Bharat Express or the bullet train project have attracted disproportionate attention and investment, while critical sectors like track maintenance and safety have attracted little investment.

India's export loss due to higher US tariffs limited to 0.3 to 0.4 pc of GDP

New Delhi, June 20 (GNS) The direct export loss from the higher US tariffs announced on Indian exports could be limited to around 0.3-0.4 per cent of its GDP as the country's largely domestic-driven economy and its relatively low share of goods exports to the US should provide some cushion, according to a CareEdge Ratings report released on Friday. "Not only is India's overall export dependence relatively low, but its merchandise export exposure to the US is also low at around 2 per cent of GDP, offering additional resilience," the report contends. Moreover, India's services exports remain outside the scope of these tariffs and should continue to support the external sector, the report states. The report also projects the current account deficit (CAD) to remain manageable at 0.9 per cent of GDP in FY26. Any diversification



in India's oil imports away from Russia is expected to have a minimal impact on India's CAD, as the price differential between Russian Ural and the benchmark Brent Crude has significantly narrowed to around \$3 per barrel from an average of \$20 per barrel in 2023. India's merchandise exports to the US stood at \$87 billion in FY25. Electronic goods accounted for the largest share of exports at

17.6 per cent. This was followed by pharma products (11.8 per cent) and gems & jewellery (11.5 per cent). The US accounts for 37 per cent of India's total electronic exports. Select items from this sector have been temporarily exempted from the 25 per cent US tariffs. Additionally, India's pharma exports to the US (accounting for 35 per cent of India's total pharma exports) have also been ex-

cluded from the tariffs, the report states. However, the overarching risk of sector-specific tariff action remains. India has one of the highest numbers of US FDA-approved manufacturing facilities catering to the generic medicine requirements of the US. While tariff uncertainties persist, the sector's fundamental competitive advantages offer some resilience, the report observes.

7 coal blocks successfully auctioned in 12th round, to create 7,098 jobs: Centre

New Delhi, June 20 (GNS) The government on Friday said that a total of seven coal blocks have been successfully auctioned, comprising three fully explored and four partially explored coal blocks. These blocks are expected to generate an annual revenue of approximately Rs 719.90 crore (excluding partially explored blocks), likely to attract a capital investment of around Rs 787.50 crore, and create 7,098 employment opportunities. The Coal Ministry launched the 12th round of coal block auctions for commercial mining on March 27. In the forward auctions, held from July 28 to July 31, a total of seven coal blocks have been auctioned. These seven blocks hold a combined geological reserve of approximately 1,761.49 million tonnes. The cumulative Peak Rated Capacity (PRC) of these blocks stands at 5.25 MTPA (excluding partially



explored coal blocks), according to the ministry. The auctions witnessed intense competition, achieving an average revenue share of 26.70 per cent, the official statement added. Since the inception of commercial coal mining in 2020, a total of 131 coal blocks have been auctioned successfully, with a production capacity of 277.31 million tonnes per year. Once operationalised, these blocks

will immensely contribute to enhancing domestic coal production and to making the country self-reliant in the coal sector. Collectively, these blocks are expected to generate annual revenue of Rs 39,359 crore, capital investment of Rs 41,597 crore and provide employment for 3,74,916 people in coal-bearing regions. Meanwhile, India's total coal production has already crossed the 1 billion tonnes

(BT) mark in the financial year 2024-25, and the coal output of the country's largest company, Coal India Limited (CIL), is targeted to cross the 1 billion tonnes mark by 2026-27. Coal India Ltd produced 781.07 million tonnes in 2024-25, and the target for 2026-27 has been fixed at 1,004.00 billion tonnes. Most of the country's coal requirement is met through indigenous production.

India's textiles exports crossed \$37.75 billion in 2024-25: Minister

New Delhi, June 20 (GNS) India's overall exports of textiles & apparel surged past \$37.75 billion in 2024-25, which represented a 5 per cent increase over the corresponding figure of 35.87 billion for the previous financial year, the Parliament was informed. The government is implementing several schemes to enhance investments, generate employment opportunities and boost exports in the textile sector, Minister of State for Textiles Pabitra Margherita said in a written reply in the Rajya Sabha. It has approved seven sites for the setting up of PM MITRA Parks, one each in Gujarat, Karnataka, Madhya Pradesh, Maharashtra, Tamil Nadu, Telangana, and Uttar Pradesh. Infrastructure works worth Rs 1,197.33 crore for providing external infrastructure till the Park gates have been started by various state governments, and an expenditure of Rs 291.61



crore has been incurred so far, the minister said. The government is also implementing the National Handloom Development Programme and the Raw Material Supply Scheme to modernise and strengthen the handloom sector and for the welfare of handloom workers across the country. Under these schemes, financial assistance is provided to eligible handloom agencies and workers for raw materials, procurement of upgraded looms & accessories, solar lighting units, construction of workshops, product diversification & design

innovation, technical and common infrastructure, marketing of handloom products in domestic/overseas markets, concessional loans under weavers' MUDRA scheme and social security, the minister said. Besides, the government is implementing the Samarth scheme for capacity building in the textiles sector. The scheme aims to provide demand-driven, placement-oriented skilling programmes to supplement the efforts of the industry in creating jobs in the organised textile and related sectors, covering the entire value chain of textiles.

GCCs in India projected to reach over 2,200 by 2030

New Delhi, May 21 (UNI) The number of Global Capability Centres (GCC) in India are expected to increase from 1,700 to over 2,200 by 2030, a report said on Friday. There will be a 25-30 per cent increase in REIT asset under management (AUM) in the coming years due to a wider range of asset classes and a steady stream of investable assets, said domestic investment bank SBI Capital Markets (SBICAPS) in its report. Leasing for office spaces broke the previous record by 20 per cent in CY24, with rents increasing and vacancy decreasing. Momentum continues in CY25, with activity particularly strong in Bengaluru, Delhi-NCR, and Pune, according to the report by investment banking arm of State Bank of India (SBI). GCC were the main demand source, with multinational firms using India for core activities rather than labour arbitrage. The report predicted 1.3 times growth

for these facilities in the next few years. Flex spaces saw 43 per cent YoY growth in leasing in H1 CY25, recording the highest ever leasing in a six-month period ever. "Formalisation of the sector, which started with RERA and IBC has reached a crescendo. These factors have increased the thirst for funds. Promoters have tapped into the QIP route aggressively in FY25 to raise equity," the report mentioned. Alternate investment funds (AIFs) are increasingly involved in the high-risk, high-reward early stage of land purchase and construction finance. Real estate was their largest investment sector in CY25, roughly double the next sector, the report said. With several regulatory actions in favour of institutional capital and sectoral cashflows stabilising, the trend of diverse fundraising (IPOs, AIFs, sovereign wealth funds etc.) will continue, the report added.

India has 29,277 EV charging stations, Karnataka leads: Minister

New Delhi, June 20 (GNS) There are now a total of 29,277 electric vehicle (EV) charging stations across the country, the Parliament was informed. Karnataka leads with 6,097 EV charging stations, followed by Maharashtra at 4,155 and Uttar Pradesh at 2,326, Minister of State for Steel and Heavy Industries, Bhupathiraju Srinivasa Varma, told the Lok Sabha in a written reply. The Power Ministry issued the 'Guidelines for Installation and Operation of Electric Vehicle Charging Infrastructure-2024', in September last year, and the 'Guidelines for Installation and Operation of Battery Swapping and Charging Stations', in January this year, which lay down standards and protocols for developing a nationwide network of electric vehicle charging infrastructure, battery charging, and battery swapping stations. "An allocation of Rs 2,000 crore has been made



under the PM E-DRIVE Scheme to support the "setting up of adequate public charging infrastructure for various categories of electric vehicles" on a pan-India basis in consultation with ministries, states and other stakeholders," informed the minister. The PM E-DRIVE scheme was launched in October 2024 to accelerate the adoption of electric vehicles (EVs) through demand incentives and expand EV charging infrastructure nationwide. The Centre has allocated Rs 10,900 crore for subsidies to EVs under this scheme. When it comes to Tier-2

cities, there are as many as 4,625 EV charging stations operational in the country (as on April 1, 2025). Meanwhile, the government has supported a total of 18,84,905 electric vehicles (EVs) under the Faster Adoption and Manufacturing of (Hybrid and) Electric Vehicles in India (FAME India) scheme till June 30 this year. Under the FAME-II scheme, the government supported 16,29,600 vehicles. The FAME-II scheme sanctioned a total of Rs 912.50 crore for the installation of 9,332 EV PCS, out of which 8,885 EVPCS have been installed (as on June 30), said Varma.

Shivraj Singh Chouhan Reviews Development in Raisen, Orders Strict Action Against Fertiliser Black Marketing and Focus on Welfare Schemes

New Delhi, June 20 (GNS) Union Minister for Agriculture and Rural Development, Shri Shivraj Singh Chouhan, visited his parliamentary constituency Vidisha yesterday, and held a meeting of the District Development Coordination and Monitoring Committee (DISHA) in Raisen. The meeting involved in-depth discussions on public welfare issues such as dead-ditch, black marketing of fertilisers, counterfeit fertilisers, Pradhan Mantri Awas Yojana, Pradhan Mantri Gram Sadak Yojana, Lakhpati Didis under the National Rural Livelihoods Mission, water infrastructure, and the progress of the work undertaken energy department. "Selling fake fertiliser is a grave sin - take strict action against offenders" The Union Minister obtained scheme-wise information during the review of the agriculture department's work in the district.



He directed that strictest action be taken against people who are engaged in black marketing or selling counterfeit fertilisers, as it amounts to a grave injustice against farmers. He also inquired about the procurement of 'moong' (green gram) and instructed officials to inspect procurement centers. "Focus on public welfare and development while working" The Union Minister Shri Chouhan urged public rep-

resentatives and officials to make Raisen a model district in terms of development and welfare. He directed them to tour their respective areas and ensure that eligible individuals who have not yet received benefits under any scheme are included at the earliest. Construction projects should be completed on time with intensive monitoring, the minister emphasised. "PM Awas installments must be released on

time" While reviewing the work of the PM Awas Yojana (Gramin) - Awas Plus, Shri Chouhan instructed that the scheme should be implemented in such a way that beneficiaries receive their installments on time. He stressed on ensuring zero negligence in construction works and called for rigorous monitoring at the district level to ensure timely completion. In the fiscal year 2024-25, as many as 27,981 houses have been

approved across all Gram Panchayats of the district - 4,825 are complete, and 23,156 are under progress. "Raisen district has 43,613 Lakhpati Didis" Shivraj Singh Chouhan reviewed the progress under the National Rural Livelihoods Mission and asked for a detailed count of Lakhpati Didis. He weighed on the fact that more and more women should be empowered to become Lakhpati Didis through a concrete

action plan. It has been said that the district currently has 43,613 Lakhpati Didis. "Connect every village to main roads" During a review of roads under the Pradhan Mantri Gram Sadak Yojana, the Minister directed that every village be connected to main roads, ensuring seamless rural connectivity and improved access to services. It was reported that under the 2024-25 plan, 30 roads covering 276.236 km have been sanctioned, of which 28 roads have been completed. Similarly, of 13 sanctioned bridges, 9 have been completed. The meeting also reviewed the work of National Highways Authority of India. "Agriculture officials must inspect crops in the fields" The Minister directed agriculture officers to visit fields regularly and advise farmers about appropriate pesticides in case of crop diseases.

GST collections rise 7.5 pc in July to Rs 1.96 lakh cr

Mumbai, June 20 (GNS) India's Goods and Services Tax (GST) collections rose to Rs 1.96 lakh crore in July, up 7.5 per cent from the same month of the previous year, according to government data released. The increase was driven by higher revenue from both domestic transactions and imports, reflecting steady economic activity, though the growth pace was slower than in recent months. Between April and July this year, gross GST revenue stood at Rs 8.18 lakh crore -- marking a 10.7 per cent jump from Rs 7.39 lakh crore in the same period of 2024. In July, the total gross GST collection comprised Rs 35,470 crore from Central GST, Rs 44,059 crore from State GST, Rs 1,03,536 crore from Integrated GST (including Rs 51,626 crore from imports), and Rs 12,670 crore from cess (including Rs 1,086 crore from imports). While July marked

the seventh consecutive month with collections above Rs 1.8 lakh crore, the figure was lower than the Rs 2.1 lakh crore average seen in the first quarter of FY26. GST receipts had hit a record Rs 2.37 lakh crore in April before easing to Rs 2.01 lakh crore in May. After adjusting for refunds, the net GST revenue for July stood at Rs 1,68,588 crore, just 1.7 per cent higher than Rs 1,65,800 crore a year ago. The modest growth was due to a sharp 66.8 per cent surge in refunds, which touched Rs 27,147 crore for the month compared to Rs 16,275 crore in July 2024. For the April-July period, net GST revenue rose 8.4 per cent to Rs 7.11 lakh crore from Rs 6.56 lakh crore the previous year. State-wise performance was mixed. Smaller northeastern states posted strong gains, with Tripura leading at 41 per cent growth, followed by Meghalaya (26 per cent), Sikkim (23 per cent).

Telangana SIR: Door-to-Door Voter Roll Revision From June 25



Hyderabad, June 20 (GNS): Telangana Chief Electoral Officer C Sudarshan Reddy on Saturday said all arrangements have been completed for the Special Intensive Revision (SIR) of electoral rolls aimed at ensuring that every eligible citizen is enrolled as a voter and ineligible entries are removed from the rolls.

Addressing a media briefing at BRK Bhavan, the CEO said Booth Level Officers (BLOs) will begin door-to-door distribution of enumeration forms from June 25 as part of the SIR process. The exercise will continue until July 24, and there will be no extension of the deadline.

Sudarshan Reddy said BLOs have been specially trained to assist voters in filling up the forms and will visit every household at least three times for distribution and collection of the forms. He added that

Booth Level Agents (BLAs) are also being trained to support the process in their respective polling station areas.

The CEO informed that voters can also submit their enumeration forms online through the Election Commission's portal. He said extensive awareness and publicity campaigns are being conducted across the state to ensure maximum public participation in the revision process. Appealing to voters to cooperate with BLOs during their visits, Sudarshan Reddy emphasized that the Special Intensive Revision is being undertaken by the Election Commission of India to improve the accuracy and inclusiveness of the electoral rolls. Additional Chief Electoral Officer Vasam Venkateswar Reddy, Joint CEO M. Satyavani and other senior officials were present at the briefing.

Governor Shukla Highlights Yoga's Role in Health and Harmony

Students to get welcome kits: Minister Ponnam

Hyderabad, June 20 (GNS): Telangana BC Welfare Minister Ponnam Prabhakar on Saturday said BC Welfare hostels recorded an impressive 96.05 per cent pass rate in the SSC examinations for 2025-26, surpassing the state average of 95.15 per cent. Reviewing the department's performance at Praja Bhavan, the Minister said 4,746 of the 4,941 students who appeared for the examinations passed, while 285 hostels achieved 100 per cent results and 641 students secured over 500 marks. He directed officials to improve academic standards further through special coaching, mentoring and model examinations.



Ponnam announced that students in BC Welfare hostels would be provided with

a comprehensive "Welcome Kit" containing uniforms, notebooks, bedsheets, trunk boxes, school bags, track-suits, shoes, socks, blankets and stationery items. He also stressed student safety,

hygiene and nutrition, directing officials to ensure clean hostel premises, functional RO plants and water coolers, and the supply of quality food as per the prescribed menu.

The Minister instructed officials to fill hostel vacancies, conduct parent-teacher meetings by the end of June, expedite pending Kalyana Lakshmi applications and create awareness about welfare schemes, including the Centre's SEED programme.

He also said free coaching for UPSC, Group Services, SSC, Banking and RRB examinations is being provided through 12 BC Study Circles across the state and announced that a dedicated Study Circle building at Siddipet would be inaugurated soon. The review meeting was attended by Government Advisor V. Hanumantha Rao, BC Welfare Commissioner Balamayadevi and senior departmental officials, an official release said.

Bhatti Vikramarka calls healthcare key to true development

Hyderabad, June 20 (GNS): Telangana Deputy Chief Minister Mallu Bhatti Vikramarka on Saturday said the health of the people is the truest indicator of development and stressed the need to make quality healthcare accessible and affordable for all sections of society. Addressing the India Health Summit as the chief guest, Bhatti Vikramarka said healthcare is not merely a government responsibility but a basic necessity for every citizen. He noted that illness often pushes families into financial distress, wiping out savings accumulated over a lifetime, and emphasized that no poor person should fear entering a hospital because of treatment costs.



Recalling the evolution of India's public healthcare system, the Deputy Chief Minister said the foundations were laid by successive governments through initiatives such as the establishment of AIIMS, the Integrated Child Develop-

ment Services (ICDS), the Universal Immunization Programme, the National Rural Health Mission and the ASHA worker network.

He also highlighted the contribution of the Aarogya health insurance scheme, stating that it provided confidence to poor families by enabling access to costly treatments for serious ailments in corporate hospitals. Bhatti Vikramarka said advancements in medical technology, telemedicine and digital healthcare should not remain confined to the corporate sector but must reach the underprivi-

leged and marginalized sections of society. He stressed that leadership in healthcare is a responsibility and that scientific innovation and technology should serve ordinary citizens, particularly the poor. Calling for a shift in healthcare priorities, the Deputy Chief Minister said the system should evolve from an "illness-care" model focused on treatment to a "wellness-care" model centred on disease prevention.

"Prevention is far more effective and affordable than treatment after illness occurs," he observed.

Describing Telangana as

the emerging public health capital of India, Bhatti Vikramarka said the state government is strengthening district hospitals, expanding medical education institutions and promoting nursing and paramedical education. He also underlined the importance of public-private partnerships in healthcare, stating that such collaborations should focus on delivering better services to citizens rather than merely generating profits.

The Deputy Chief Minister said Telangana is preparing to meet the healthcare sector's future manpower requirements through skill development and capacity building initiatives.

With Hyderabad's strong pharmaceutical ecosystem, Medical Devices Park, IT talent pool and government support, Telangana is well positioned to emerge as a global centre for medical innovation, diagnostics and digital healthcare solutions, he added.

12 years of Modi Govt marked by welfare, transparency and development: K Laxman

Hyderabad, June 20 (GNS): Rajya Sabha MP K Laxman on Saturday said the last twelve years under the leadership of Prime Minister Narendra Modi have been marked by inclusive development, welfare-driven governance, transparency and rapid infrastructure growth across the country.

Speaking at the 'VARTA' media interaction programme organised by the Press Information Bureau

(PIB) in Hyderabad, Dr Laxman highlighted flagship schemes such as Pradhan Mantri Awas Yojana, PM SVANidhi, PM Mudra Yojana, Pradhan Mantri Ujjwala Yojana, Ayushman Bharat and Pradhan Mantri Jan Dhan Yojana, stating that they have transformed the lives of crores of poor and marginalised citizens.

He said over 11 crore women have benefited from the Ujjwala scheme, more than

81 crore people are receiving free food grains, and technology-driven governance through the JAM (Jan Dhan-Aadhaar-Mobile) framework has ensured direct benefit transfers, reducing corruption and eliminating middlemen. He added that nearly 25 crore people have been lifted out of poverty through targeted welfare interventions.

Highlighting Telangana's development, Dr Laxman said the state has witnessed



the construction of nearly 5,000 kilometres of additional National Highways over the past 12 years, taking the total highway network to around 10,000 kilometres, with investments exceeding Rs 1.20 lakh crore. He also pointed to major railway projects, including the redevelopment of Secunderabad Railway Station, development of the Cherlapalli Terminal, establishment of a railway manufacturing unit

at Kazipet and rail connectivity expansion to Medak, Siddipet and Komuravelli.

The BJP leader further noted that Telangana has benefited from multiple Vande Bharat Express services and proposed high-speed rail corridors linking Hyderabad with Bengaluru, Chennai and Pune.

He also highlighted Central support for new airports at Mamnoon and Adilabad and other infrastructure projects

aimed at boosting economic growth. Senior journalist Kasturi Raka Sudhakar Rao stressed the importance of

direct communication between governments and citizens, highlighting digital platforms such as MyGov, social media and the Prime Minister's "Mann Ki Baat" programme as effective tools for public engagement. He also cautioned against the misuse of digital media for spreading misinformation.

KTR Slams Crop Procurement Policy, Defends BRS Farmer Schemes

Hyderabad, June 20 (GNS): Bharat Rashtra Samithi (BRS) Working President K T Rama Rao on Saturday strongly criticised the Telangana government's reported decision to limit crop procurement, alleging that it would severely impact farmers across the state. Addressing a BRS general body meeting in the Boath constituency of Adilabad district, KTR claimed that the state government had decided to procure crops only to the extent permitted by the Centre, leaving farmers to find buyers for the remaining produce. He alleged that the

move would adversely affect paddy growers as well as farmers cultivating crops such as jowar, Bengal gram, red gram and soybeans.

Questioning the Congress government, KTR said Chief Minister A Revanath Reddy had earlier promised to procure "every grain" produced by farmers and accused the government of backtracking on that assurance. He urged farmers to question Congress leaders about procurement centres, bonus payments and the alleged distress being faced by the farming community. The BRS leader also called upon both Congress

and BJP MPs from Telangana to exert pressure on the Centre to ensure crop procurement.

He recalled that during the tenure of former Chief Minister K Chandrashekar Rao, the state government had protested before the Centre and secured paddy procurement despite initial reluctance from the union government. Highlighting the BRS government's record, KTR said schemes such as Rythu Bandhu, Rythu Bima, loan waivers, irrigation projects and Mission Kakatiya had transformed Telangana into a leading agricultural state.

Telangana to restore Buddhist heritage sites at Phanigiri, Gajulabanda

Hyderabad, June 20 (GNS): The Telangana Department of Heritage will launch conservation and restoration works at the historic Buddhist heritage sites of Phanigiri and Gajulabanda in Suryapet district, with a foundation stone laying ceremony scheduled for June 22.

The restoration programme is being undertaken as part of the state's efforts to preserve and promote its rich cultural and archaeological heritage, the Heritage Department said in a release here on Saturday. The works are being funded through the Corporate So-

cial Responsibility (CSR) initiative of TG GENCO (YTSP). An amount of 1.60 crore has been allocated for conservation works at Phanigiri, while 23 lakh has been sanctioned for restoration and protection works at Gajulabanda. Minister for Prohibition & Excise, Tourism, Culture and Archaeology, Jupally Krishna Rao will lay the foundation stone in the presence of local MLA Mandula Samuel and other public representatives. Phanigiri, located in Nagaram Mandal of Suryapet district, is regarded as one of Telangana's most important Buddhist archaeological sites.

Historical evidence suggests it served as a major centre of both Hinayana and Mahayana Buddhist traditions and functioned as a significant seat of learning and monastic activity. Excavations carried out since the 1940s have unearthed major archaeological remains, including a Mahastupa, Chaitya halls, monastic complexes, votive stupas, sculptural panels depicting episodes from the life of Gautama Buddha, Jataka stories, Brahma inscriptions, pottery, terracotta artefacts, beads and coins from the Satavahana and Ikshvaku periods.
