

No infighting, Congress as anchor: Inside details from INDIA bloc meet

New Delhi, June 8 (GNS): The meeting of Opposition parties under the banner of the INDIA bloc concluded this evening, with a broader consensus on redrawing electoral as well as political strategy and pursuing a "united and spirited" fight against the BJP-led NDA government.

The INDIA bloc allies, after holding wide-ranging discussions and deliberations, zeroed in on five key decisions to sharpen their campaign and strategy in taking on the NDA dispensation over multiple pressing issues, including Special Intensive Revision (SIR), paper leaks, unemployment and 'worrying' economic environment prevailing in the country.



Among the foremost decisions, the INDIA bloc parties will write a letter to the Chief Justice of India (CJI) regarding serious apprehensions over the Special Intensive Revision (SIR), alleged manipulation of the electoral rolls, and the fairness of elec-

tions. The parties expressed unanimity in penning and handing over a 'protest letter' to the CJI shortly.

The second decision revolved around students' agony and despair over the recent NEET paper leaks. Multiple leaders voiced

strong concern over the mismanagement of the entire education system under incumbent Education Minister Dharmendra Pradhan and called for intensifying demands to seek his resignation. They said that lakhs of youths appearing for NEET

and CBSE examinations have been betrayed and left to fend for themselves during his tenure, and hence answers must be sought from those in the chair.

Raising alarm bells over the emergent economic climate of the country, the IN-

DIA bloc leaders demanded that the Central government immediately convene an all-party meeting to discuss the current grave economic situation, rising unemployment, inflation, issues concerning farmers, and other important matters of public interest.

Earlier, Congress president Mallikarjun Kharge, in his opening remarks, slammed the Centre for 'pushing' the country into a precarious situation due to its inefficient steering of the economy and flawed foreign policy. The INDIA bloc meeting, coming in the backdrop of a big electoral setback in recent Assembly polls, also deliberated upon ways to strengthen the alliance. It was agreed that all parties of the INDIA alliance would meet every two months. The next meeting has been scheduled for August in Hyderabad.

Also, when the Monsoon Session of Parliament begins, a coordination meeting will be held every morning at the office of the Leader

of Opposition Mallikarjun Kharge, where the INDIA bloc will brainstorm on taking on the Centre with unity and unwavering focus on issues of public interest.

The INDIA bloc meet was attended by Congress president Mallikarjun Kharge, Senior Congress leader Rahul Gandhi, Samajwadi Party Chief Akhilesh Yadav, Trinamool Congress President Mamata Banerjee, Senior National Conference Leader Omar Abdullah and NCP-SP leader Supriya Sule. Opposition parties, including Aam Aadmi Party (AAP) and Dravida Munnetra Kazhagam (DMK), distanced themselves from the meeting over differences with the Congress party.

20 TMC MPs to quit party, join NDA: Kakoli Ghosh



Kolkata, June 8 (GNS) In a major jolt to the Mamata Banerjee-led TMC, 20 party members in the Lok Sabha have decided to quit the Trinamool Congress and make a bid to Lok Sabha Speaker Om Birla to formally join the BJP-led NDA parliamentary party.

"Nearly 20 TMC MPs, including me, have decided to write to the Speaker and formally convey our desire to be part of the NDA. The decision comes after extensive discussions among fellow MPs. As of now, I remain the chief whip of the TMC in the Lok Sabha, and in that capacity I have consulted colleagues before arriving at this decision," Kakoli told The Tribune.

Reacting to her replacement as chief whip after she resigned as TMC Ma-

hila wing chief, Kakoli said her removal was arbitrary and unilateral.

"The party chairperson may have announced my replacement from the post, but that does not alter the constitutional and parliamentary position overnight," she told TNS.

Kakoli said the MPs have accepted the people's verdict and believe that their future political course should be aligned with the NDA. "Accordingly, we will communicate our decision to the Speaker. We want to be part of the NDA," she said adding that the letter to Speaker will follow.

Once this happens the TMC legislature party in Lok Sabha would have split and merged in the NDA as Aam Aadmi Party recently did in Rajya Sabha.

SC quashes bail condition restricting accused from disputed property

New Delhi, June 8 (GNS) In a significant ruling shaping bail jurisprudence, the Supreme Court has held that courts, while granting anticipatory bail, cannot impose conditions that amount to granting substantive relief in a pending civil dispute.

A bench of Justices J.B. Pardiwala and K.V. Viswanathan made the observations while partly allowing appeals filed by accused persons against a Madras High Court order that had restrained them from interfering with a disputed property until the conclusion of a civil suit.

Setting aside the impugned condition, the apex court said that the High Court, while granting anticipatory bail, ought not to have imposed a restriction that was akin to granting relief in the civil proceedings. "We are of the view that while granting anticipatory bail, the High Court should not have imposed a condition which is tantamount to granting of some relief in the suit itself, which otherwise the civil court has not



granted," the Justice Pardiwala-led Bench said.

The case arose from an FIR registered at Perunazhi Police Station in Tamil Nadu's Ramanathapuram district for offences under various provisions of the Bharatiya Nyaya Sanhita (BNS), 2023, including allegations of trespass, causing damage to property and criminal intimidation.

According to the prosecution, the accused persons had allegedly trespassed into land claimed by the de facto complainant, damaged fencing, banana crops, CCTV cameras and electrical installations, and threatened the complainant and her family members. While granting anticipatory bail on February 24, the Madurai Bench of the Madras High Court directed that

the accused "shall not interfere in the disputed property until the suit is over", apart from imposing other bail conditions. The High Court had taken note of rival claims over the property and the pendency of a civil suit before the sub-court at Mudukulathur. It observed that the de facto complainant claimed possession of the property on the basis of a mortgage and held that it would be appropriate to restrain the accused from interfering with the disputed property until the matter was resolved.

Before the Supreme Court, it was highlighted that the complainant had instituted a civil suit for permanent injunction in 2019 and that no interim injunction had been granted by the civil court.

India, US likely to sign 1st tranche of trade deal by july: Piyush Goyal

New Delhi, June 8 (GNS) India could sign the first tranche of its long-awaited bilateral trade agreement with the United States as early as July, Commerce and Industry Minister Piyush Goyal said on Monday.

Speaking to media on the sideline of an event, Goyal further indicated that negotiations between the two countries are nearing a crucial stage despite recent tariff-related concerns. The minister's remarks have raised expectations of an early breakthrough in trade talks that have been underway for months, with both sides seeking to strengthen economic ties and improve market access for businesses. The proposed agreement is expected to provide a significant boost to bilateral trade and enhance opportunities for Indian exporters in key sectors.

Speaking about the progress of the negotiations, Goyal suggested that discussions between officials from India and the United States have ad-



vanced considerably in recent weeks and that efforts are underway to resolve the remaining issues.

The latest comments build on statements made by the minister last week, when he highlighted the rapid pace of engagement between the two countries. On June 5, Goyal said that a full team of US trade officials had visited New Delhi and held extensive discussions with their Indian counterparts to push the negotiations forward.

"We had a full team of officials from different divisions of trade from the U.S. in Delhi," Goyal had said. According to the minister, both sides are working to close the re-

maining gaps in the proposed agreement and are focused on reaching a mutually beneficial outcome.

He had expressed confidence that the first phase of the trade pact could be finalised by the middle of July, describing it as a "very vibrant first tranche" that would lay the foundation for deeper economic cooperation between the two countries.

The proposed trade agreement is seen as a key step in expanding India-US economic relations at a time when both nations are looking to diversify supply chains, increase investment flows and strengthen strategic partnerships across sectors.

Iran retaliates, fires missiles at Israeli airbases after attacks on Tehran

Tehran/ Tel Aviv, Jun 8 (UNI) The Middle East edged closer to a wider regional conflict on Monday as Iran launched missiles at Israel in retaliation for Israeli strikes on Iranian territory, defying diplomatic efforts by US President Donald Trump to contain the crisis. The exchange of attacks has raised fresh concerns that months of fragile diplomacy is in tatters as fresh military confrontation is underway.

The escalation came after Trump reportedly told Netanyahu that "it's enough" and urged him not to retaliate immediately following Iran's missile attack on Sunday night. It was the first direct exchange of strikes be-



tween Israel and Iran since a ceasefire halted the US-Israel war with Iran in April. Iran's attack followed earlier Israeli strikes on Beirut's southern suburb of Dahiya.

The latest exchange of attacks threatens to deepen tensions across the region and comes after Trump

spoke with Netanyahu, urging him not to respond immediately to Iran's missile barrage. According to media reports, Trump declared, "I call all the shots," suggesting that Netanyahu should refer to Washington's diplomatic efforts.

Iranian state media re-

ported explosions in Tehran, Isfahan, Karaj, and Tabriz. Iran's Revolutionary Guards claimed that Israel used air-launched ballistic missiles during the attack.

Iran subsequently closed the airspace around Tehran's Imam Khomeini International Airport, the coun-

try's main international gateway. In response to the Islamic Revolutionary Guards Corps (IRGC) said it had targeted two Israeli air bases in Nevatim and Tel Nof, according to Iranian state media.

According to Iranian military officials, the missile barrage was launched in response to Israel's attack on Beirut's southern suburb of Dahiya. In a televised statement, Iranian central command spokesperson Ibrahim Zolfaghari said Tehran viewed the Israeli operation as crossing a "red line" and accused the United States of enabling Israeli actions through its political support. Al Jazeera reported.

"Defense systems are operating to intercept the threat" and members of the public living "in the relevant

We have 76-80 days of oil reserves, no immediate risk to country: Puri

New Delhi, June 8 (GNS) As the West Asia crisis intensifies, with Iran launching fresh attacks on Israel on Sunday night, Union Minister of Petroleum Hardeep Singh Puri on Monday said India has fuel reserves equal to 76-80 days of usage and is ready to respond to global oil shortages.

Puri cautioned that the world economy might suffer considerably from an extended conflict in West Asia, adding that he expects fuel prices to come down and also assured that there was no immediate energy risk to the country. He added that even if the Strait of Hormuz stays closed, India has adequate strategic petroleum reserves,



refinery inventories, and commercial stocks to give at least 30 to 60 days of buffer, thus he doesn't see oil prices being "this high" for very long. Meanwhile, in response to concerns about the important waterway potentially closing, the minister highlighted that India has sufficient

energy supply and has diversified its sources. The comments are made at a time when the future of the Strait of Hormuz, which passes through a sizable amount of the world's oil and gas supply, remains uncertain. India has backup plans and support from allies to handle

temporary delays, said the Minister. "Here, two or three things are taking place. The violence spreading beyond the theater is one extreme scenario. That would be concerning. The second is that our diverse supplies have also begun, given the Strait of Hormuz remains blocked.

Fire reported on oil tanker with 24 Indian seafarers off Oman coast

New Delhi, June 8 (GNS) A fire was reported aboard an oil tanker carrying 24 Indian seafarers off the coast of Oman on Monday, as Israel and Iran exchanged fresh attacks in their first major escalation since the ceasefire. The Madagascar-flagged MT Marivex reported a fire around 1.30 pm IST, Opesh Sharma, a director in India's Ministry of Ports, Shipping and Waterways, said at a news briefing.

Sharma declined to comment on the cause of the fire but said the vessel was carrying 24 Indian crew members. The tanker was empty and located well outside the Strait of Hormuz, a key shipping



route that has been affected by regional tensions, he said. "This is the preliminary information which we have received... as per available information, all Indian seafarers are safe," Sharma said. "We are coordinating with the Ministry of External Affairs, our missions abroad, Indian Navy, Min-

istry of Defence, to ensure their safety." Ship-tracking data showed the vessel at anchor south of Muscat. The tanker issued a distress call after reportedly coming under attack while sailing towards the Omani port of Duqm, according to preliminary reports. The incident came as Is-

rael and Iran renewed hostilities. Israel on Monday struck a petrochemical facility in southwestern Iran and carried out attacks on other military targets, despite reports that US President Donald Trump had urged Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu to avoid further military action.

Must Ensure Farmers Get Loan Waiver, Stringent Conditions Need Correction: Sharad Pawar

Baramati, June 8 (GNS) Nationalist Congress Party (Sharadchandra Pawar) President Sharad Pawar on Monday emphasised the need to modify the restrictive conditions in the government's Rs 36,585 crore loan waiver scheme to ensure actual benefits reach the farmers. Speaking to reporters in Baramati, Pawar advocated for a dialogue-based approach rather than outright rejection of government policies. Highlighting that there are no major elections scheduled for the next three years, Pawar stressed the importance of keeping all stakeholders united.

Commenting on the complexities of the government's loan waiver scheme, he said, "The loan waiver scheme comes with certain condi-

tions that are causing hurdles. Often, when a government makes a decision, the public may not agree with its framework. However, in a democracy, it is essential to establish a healthy dialogue to correct these flaws. That is all I would say."

He further urged the Chief Minister to coordinate with Central authorities to iron out these wrinkles. "Instead of adopting a stance to completely discard the policy just because it has certain loopholes, the focus should be on how the Chief Minister can liaise with the relevant Central authorities to amend these conditions and ensure that farmers successfully receive the loan waiver," Pawar clarified. Pawar's statement comes when the Punyashlok Ahilya



adevi Holkar farm loan waiver scheme will benefit 55.72 lakh farmers in the state, and will completely clear the land records (Satbara) of nearly 16.74 lakh farmers. However, the state government has laid down strict conditions, and has mandated severe exclusion filters. According to the cabinet decision, current or former Ministers, Members of

Parliament (Lok Sabha/Rajya Sabha), Members of the Legislative Council (MLC), and leaders of local government bodies are excluded from the scheme. All working and retired officers/employees of Central and State government departments with a gross monthly salary/pension exceeding Rs 25,000 (excluding

former military personnel) will not be eligible to get the benefits under the scheme.

Employees of Public Sector Undertakings (PSUs), cooperative banks, and sugar factories drawing monthly payouts above Rs 25,000 won't be part of the scheme. Further, any individuals generating non-agricultural income who file regular income tax will not be entitled to be a beneficiary of the scheme. Expressing deep concern over the agricultural distress in the region, Pawar revealed that a team of experts had already assessed the ground reality. "I have received the assessment report. Banana and sugarcane crops have suffered massive damage. We had dispatched a team of experts from the Vasantdada Sugar

Institute, and they have submitted their written findings and recommendations after inspecting the affected areas. While the scientists have completed their visit, the ultimate execution does not lie in our hands," he added.

On the INDIA bloc meeting in New Delhi, Pawar said, "Today is a review meeting. We will convene key leaders again in eight to ten days to find a way forward. I am confident a solution will be reached. The core strategy for today's meeting is to ensure that no member takes an extreme stance. Representing our party, Supriya Sule has attended the meeting, and the outcome will be clear by this evening. Following that, we will sit in Delhi, deliberate, and work towards a resolution."

Number Of Jan Dhan Accounts Rise To 58.15 Cr, Deposits Touch Rs 3 Lakh Crore



New Delhi, June 8 (GNS) The Prime Minister Narendra Modi-led government's initiatives during the last 12 years have strengthened access to financial inclusion, healthcare, housing, tap water, clean fuel and social security exponentially, according to a factsheet put out by Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman's office on Monday.

The statement highlights that the number of Jan Dhan bank accounts for the poor across India has touched the 58.15 crore mark, with the total deposits in these accounts increasing to Rs 3 lakh crore, which reflects the success of the scheme. The opening of these accounts under the Prime Minister's Jan Dhan Yojana in rural areas is seen as the biggest financial inclusion exercise in the world. According to RBI data, 56 per cent of the Jan Dhan accounts belong to women.

The Jan Dhan Yojana-Aadhaar-Mobile, which comprises the "JAM Trinity", has provided a quantum leap in the country's endeavour to ensure financial inclusion and ensure that the benefit of government welfare schemes reaches

the targeted beneficiaries without any leakages. The statement underlines that the number of Ayushman Bharat cards under Pradhan Mantri Jan Arogya Yojana (AB-PMJAY) has reached the 44 crore mark. The scheme provides health coverage of Rs 5 lakh per family per year for secondary and tertiary care hospitalisation to 12 crore families, constituting the bottom 40 per cent of India's population. Additionally, in March 2024, approximately 37 lakh families of Accredited Social Health Activists, Anganwadi Workers, and Anganwadi Helpers were included under the scheme. The scheme was further expanded to cover 6 crore senior citizens of age 70 years and above, belonging to 4.5 crore families, irrespective of their socio-economic status.

Besides, the statement highlights that 15.7 crore tap water connections have been issued to provide safe drinking water to the poor, over 12 crore toilets have been constructed to improve their conditions of living, and 2.9 crore households have been given electric connections under the Saubhagya scheme.

Indore to host BRICS agri meet on food security

Bhopal/Indore, June 8 (GNS) Madhya Pradesh is set to shine on the global stage as Indore hosts the prestigious "BRICS Agriculture Working Group" meeting and the Agriculture Ministers' conference from June 9 to 13 under India's presidency of the grouping. Union Minister for Agriculture and Farmers Welfare Shivraj Singh Chouhan, addressing a press conference in Bhopal, described the event as a proud moment for India and Madhya Pradesh. The meetings will deliberate on critical global issues, including food security, sustainable agriculture, empowerment of small and marginal farmers, and agricultural innovation. The

BRICS Agricultural Research Platform, set up in 2016 during India's presidency, will further strengthen research and technical cooperation.

The schedule includes official-level meetings from June 9 to 11, followed by the Agriculture Ministers' meeting on June 12 and 13, culminating in a joint declaration. Delegates will also experience Indore and Madhya Pradesh's rich cultural heritage through visits to landmarks like Rajwada, 56 Dukan, and Mandu. BRICS nations command significant influence in world agriculture, accounting for 42 per cent of global agricultural land and over 42 per cent of agricultural production.

Delhi HC issues contempt notice to influencer over videos targeting sitting judge in saket building collapse

New Delhi, June 8 (GNS) The Delhi High Court on Monday issued a criminal contempt notice to social media influencer Kapil Kakar for his videos and posts allegedly making scandalous remarks against the judiciary in connection with the recent Saket building collapse tragedy.

A division bench of Justices Neena Bansal Krishna and Madhu Jain also directed social media platforms to remove objectionable videos and posts alleging that a sitting High Court judge was responsible for the tragedy and ordered the blocking of the social media handle concerned. The order came on a criminal contempt petition filed by the Delhi High Court Bar Association



(DHCBA), which alleged that Kakar, a psychologist and social activist, had published a series of videos on YouTube, Instagram, Facebook, X, and LinkedIn containing scandalous and contemptuous remarks against a sitting judge and the judiciary.

Issuing notice in the matter, the Justice Krishna-led Bench observed that such

allegations against judges and the judiciary are becoming increasingly frequent on social media. It added that the statements made in the videos were not genuine and appeared to be an attempt to scandalise the institution of the judiciary. "We can only hope that the public does not pay any attention to it," the Delhi High Court said during

the hearing. According to the DHCHA petition, Kakar allegedly accused a sitting High Court judge of being responsible for the deaths caused by the collapse of an under-construction building in south Delhi's Saidulajab area near Saket Metro Station.

The petition alleged that Kakar falsely claimed that the judge had dismissed a plea seeking action against illegal construction activities due to an alleged nexus with municipal authorities. It further reproduced portions of the videos in which the judge was allegedly described as a "murderer", the judiciary was accused of corruption, and citizens were urged to "rise against such injustice".

Kerala women's free bus travel begins from June 15; ksrtc to face rs 57 crore burden

Thiruvananthapuram: The Kerala government's ambitious scheme to provide free travel for women in KSRTC buses will come into effect from June 15, but the benefit will initially be restricted to ordinary services alone.

The decision was taken at a high-level meeting chaired by Chief Minister V.D. Satheesan and Transport Minister C.P. John, considering KSRTC's financial constraints and operational challenges. John said the full details will be revealed by CM Satheesan, as the cabinet will first look into this and the final decision will be announced. The scheme, introduced as one of the major election



promises of the UDF government under the 'Indira Guarantee' programme, will be implemented on a trial basis for the first 100 days.

A detailed review of passenger patterns, revenue loss and operational impact will be carried out before ex-

tending the benefit to higher-category buses, including Fast Passenger and other long-distance services.

The Transport Commissioner has been asked to submit a report analysing the financial impact during the trial period. The government will take a decision on the second phase based on the findings. KSRTC estimates that around 23 lakh passengers use its services daily, of whom nearly 10 to 12 lakh are women.

Providing free travel to such a large section is expected to create a significant financial burden, which the government has assured will be fully compensated. According to KSRTC esti-

mates, limiting the scheme to ordinary buses alone will result in an additional burden of around Rs 57 crore for three months. If city fast services are also included, the loss may rise to Rs 65 crore. Extending the benefit to ordinary, Fast Passenger and Super Fast services could increase the burden to Rs 90 crore, while providing free travel across all categories of buses may cost around Rs 112 crore over three months. With the government already providing financial support for salaries and pensions, discussions are underway on arranging additional funds through the Kerala Financial Corporation (KFC).

TN CM Vijay Plays Chess With Praggnanandhaa, Awards Rs 50 Lakh For Norway Chess Triumph

Chennai: Tamil Nadu Chief Minister C. Joseph Vijay on Monday felicitated chess prodigy R. Praggnanandhaa for his historic triumph at the Norway Chess tournament and presented him with a cash award of Rs 50 lakh. The meeting took an engaging turn when CM Vijay and the 20-year-old Grandmaster sat down across a chessboard for a friendly game.

Praggnanandhaa created history in Oslo by becoming the first-ever Indian to clinch the Norway Chess title. His campaign included a rare feat; defeating home favourite and World No. 1 Magnus Carlsen twice in the classical format, alongside a



crucial victory over reigning World Champion D. Gukesh. Lauding the youngster's exceptional intellect and composure on the global stage, CM Vijay handed over the Rs 50 lakh cheque as a token of appreciation on behalf of the Tamil Nadu Sports Development Authority, along

with a memento for bringing laurels to both Tamil Nadu and the nation.

Minister for Public Works and Sports Development Aadhav Arjuna, Member Secretary of the Sports Development Authority of Tamil Nadu J. Meghanatha Reddy, I.A.S., Prag-

gnanandhaa's parents and high-ranking government officials were present during the felicitation. Pragg, who had slipped to No. 16 in the world rankings in the last list released on June 1, came up with a brilliant performance in Norway Chess as he stormed back from the brink to win the prestigious title.

He was sixth and last in the standings after the sixth round but won four games in a row, including his second win over Carlsen and a penultimate round victory, and compatriot Gukesh, which propelled him into contention for the title. This was the first such winning streak in the event since Carlsen's in 2021.

India's Crucial Oil Imports From Russia

India will in all possibility face a new tariff from the United States of as high as 100% as Trump's new policy to stop Russia's Ukraine war. An economic tool, tariffs are now caught up in Donald Trump's geo-economics.

Countries buying oil from Russia are now to be subjected to a 100% duty on all their exports to United States. Even if China could afford to defy this duty, India could ill-afford such tariffs and, also, incur America's wrath.

A new bill to this effect is set on its passage in the US legislature for imposing secondary sanctions against Russia to deter the country from executing its war. The proposal provides for imposition of 100% tariff, rather selectively at two countries, India and China, which are the principal buyers of Russian oil. The combined purchases of China and India, running into billions of dollars, have in a way bailed out Russia in its execution of war. Starved of the oil revenues, Russian war effort could collapse in no time. Russia is vulnerable to oil revenues for funding its efforts as its economy has otherwise shrunk. With the war going on for over three years, Russia faces multiple problems. Direct military costs are estimated at around \$300 billion, according to a report by CNN. Besides, Russian assets held outside the country running into billions, lie frozen



with western nations.

Many in the west have proposed to even start drawing down these frozen reserves to fund reconstruction of war ravaged Ukraine. These funds lie far out of reach of Russia. Sanctions on Russian banks have severely limited shadow transactions in Russian oils with other countries. Besides, the heat casualties in the Ukraine war and demand for more troops on the grounds have depleted the manpower base for the Russian economy. The drawing of manpower for deployment has been so damaging that freed criminals from Russian jails have been inducted into the fighting force.

Later still, Russian is bringing in troops from abroad for fighting in Ukraine. North Koreans

as well as others from diverse countries, including China, have been spotted and sometimes held in Ukraine. The draft on fight age population have started telling on supply of workers in the Russian factories. This has been particularly deep in the war related manufacturing industries, thus in turn, crippling civilian industries. Russia had banked on the United States moving away from Ukraine in its support and the sharp division between the NATO allies in Europe, on the one hand, and America on the other. However, the last round of NATO consultations have turned the tide of events.

America, frustrated with Russian president, Vladimir Putin's intransigence, has turned full circles. President Trump had expressed

his frustration with Putin and his double play. He has commented; "Putin speaks nice in the formal talks and then bombs everyone in the evening". Trump had spoken to Putin directly several occasions and Putin had escalated his war and attacks immediately thereafter. Seeing that diplomacy is not working, Trump is turning to arms twisting of Russia now. He is now resuming supplies of American arms through NATO allies and then following up with secondary economic sanctions which could hurt the Russian economy.

It will be on China now to back up Russia. In recent interactions with EU leaders, Chinese foreign minister had indicated that it could not witness Russia losing in Ukraine war. China has been playing its

hidden hand of unqualified support for Russia. However, this would come to a test now that America and the west are unified over Ukraine support and could launch some crippling blows to Russia. The present instance apart, America is using tariffs as a weapon of economic warfare ever since Trump entered his second presidency. On again, off again, Trump has been declaring against select countries ever since he got back to power. Since Trump came back into the White House and have been playing his tariff threats, American economy is going through a turmoil. The markets are in a state of flux, with the volatility indices swinging wildly. Trump had to postpone his tariffs several times in the light of financial market swings.

Courts to shed delays, reduce vacations and embrace reform

The Central Government's intention to reduce the volume of court cases should be warmly welcomed. After all, 70 per cent of cases in the courts of the country involve the Governments, whether at the Centre or in the States. On the other hand, speeding up the hearing of cases and the passing of judgments also need to be expedited. The amount of time spent on each matter too needs to be recorded.

This is perhaps not being done, and if that is the case, it is certainly not published, as it may embarrass some of the judges as well as advocates. Adjournments are the main cause of delays, and delays are the bane of justice. They are often used as tactics to slow down or even snuff out the progress of the hearings. At times, they are sought because the leading advocate of one or the other side is busy in another case in another court — maybe even in another city.

For the ensuing waste of the court's time, a repeat court fee of, say, 50 per cent of the initial amount should be charged to the side that seeks the adjournment. When the client is debited for this fee, he would learn a lesson not to engage an advocate who is so busy as to be distracted by several other cases. The freedom to appeal upwards, again and again, should be reduced. Some matters which began in a small cases court in, say, Mumbai have reached the apex court. Normally, one appeal to each side may be permitted. In special circumstances, perhaps two could be considered.

Before a hearing begins in a matter, the judge should, in consultation with both the advocates, decide how much time each of them would be given. If either side exceeds their limit, they should have to pay extra fees — rather like in a journey by a taxi. Why should the court waste its time merely because an advocate is slow to think or express themselves, or keeps repeating themselves? As a layman, I am surprised that the litigant has to begin by submitting, usually, a lengthy affidavit.

On the night before the first hearing, the judge reads and digests all that has been stated in that affidavit. In the hearing, the advocate verbally explains to the judge and the opposing advocate what is written in the affidavit. Is this not a repetitive procedure? Surely, it can be cut down? Once, I happened to get a chance to read an opinion on a matter by a Kolkata advocate as well as a London lawyer. I was surprised to see that the UK draft was written in about 300 words while the Indian one was longer, at over a thousand words. For us Indians, writing in English has not been the soul of wit. Since a great deal of legal work is written, this becomes an important area of check. Incidentally, judgments or orders are not always brief or terse.

And what about the working hours of the courts themselves — or, more accurately, the duration of the court machinery? While one does not wish to be uncharitable, their Lordships across the country's courts taking off for vacations has begun becoming the topic of much talk. In a country whose justice system is clogged with pending cases whose number runs into a few crores, such judicial holidays need a relook. It is important to bear in mind that these longish and regular vacations for judges and senior lawyers is a practice from the British days — a period when there was no air-conditioning. The summer of the Indian plains was simply unbearable for most judges, and long vacations in the hill stations of Simla, Darjeeling, Ooty, or the cold valley of Kashmir was understandable — but not in today's age, when technology has made it possible to overcome many challenges of nature.

The present hours of work in the country's courtrooms too are not encouraging, as far as utilisation of both time and manpower are concerned. Most courts begin their proceedings at 10:30 or thereabouts and conclude at 16:30 — i.e., working for six hours, but effectively five, because there is an hour off for lunch. Saturdays and Sundays are not counted here. With overburdened judges and a mountain of cases piling up by the day, it is high time a shift system was introduced in the judiciary. There is no reason why courts cannot work in shifts, reducing the workload on the judges and advocates, plus ensuring more employment opportunities for many unemployed lawyers and other associated staff. There are many advocates in the country who stand to gain by such a measure in the form of making the law and thereby, the country's legal system — accessible to the lower rungs of society.

The latter point is too obvious to bear iteration here. The then Chief Justice of India, Y K Sabharwal, had in 2006 not mooted the idea of courts needing to work in dual shifts in order to reduce the workload. The accessibility of justice to the common folk of the country has to become the topmost priority for judicial reforms in the country. Another major concern is the shortage of judges in proportion to the country's enormous population and the steadily increasing number of disputes. Vacancies in courts often remain unfilled for long periods, further worsening the backlog. Fast-track recruitment and transparent appointment procedures are essential if the justice delivery system is to become more efficient and responsive to public needs. Infrastructure in many lower courts too remains inadequate, with insufficient staff, poor digital facilities, and overcrowded premises affecting the smooth conduct of proceedings.

Technology can play a transformative role in reducing delays and improving transparency. The expansion of e-courts, digital filing systems, virtual hearings, and AI-assisted case management can significantly cut procedural delays and reduce the burden on litigants. During the pandemic, courts across India demonstrated that virtual hearings could ensure continuity of justice delivery. Many of those innovations deserve to be institutionalised permanently, especially for procedural hearings and smaller matters that do not require physical presence.

At the same time, judicial reforms must also focus on making legal processes simpler and less intimidating for ordinary citizens. Legal language is often too technical and inaccessible to the common man. Simplified procedures, concise documentation, and the wider availability of legal aid services would help bridge the gap between the judiciary and the people it serves. Justice delayed is not merely justice denied — it is also justice made unaffordable for countless citizens who spend years and significant resources pursuing cases. Ultimately, meaningful judicial reform requires cooperation between the judiciary, the executive, the legal fraternity, and civil society. Reducing pendency is not merely an administrative necessity but a democratic imperative. A justice system that is swift, accessible, and affordable strengthens public confidence in the rule of law and reinforces faith in democratic institutions. Without urgent corrective measures, the burden on courts will continue to rise, making timely justice increasingly elusive for millions. Additionally, alternative dispute resolution mechanisms such as mediation, arbitration, and Lok Adalats should be strengthened and encouraged at every stage of litigation. A significant number of civil and commercial disputes can be settled outside conventional courtrooms, reducing the burden on courts while providing quicker and less expensive solutions to litigants. Greater public awareness and institutional support for these mechanisms can help make dispute resolution more efficient.

Another important reform is the adoption of strict timelines for different categories of cases. Matters involving senior citizens, women, children, and economically weaker sections should receive priority listing and expedited hearings. Time-bound disposal of cases, coupled with regular monitoring of case progress, can prevent matters from lingering in courts for years and improve overall judicial efficiency.

Equally important is enhancing accountability and transparency within the justice delivery system. Periodic publication of data on case disposal rates, adjournments, judicial vacancies, and court performance can help identify bottlenecks and promote informed policy decisions. A transparent and technology-driven judiciary will not only improve efficiency but also strengthen public trust in the legal system and the rule of law.

New Education Policy and Dogri Language

India has about 1200 universities, around 50000 colleges which are now offering about 26 percent of GER. About 300 million students are studying in colleges and about 40 million in universities. Since 1948, we had multiple committees on education and last of it was in 2017-19 under Dr Kasturi Rangan. This paved way for the New Education Policy in 2020. The New Education Policy- 2020 aims to facilitate an inclusive, participatory and holistic approach, which takes into consideration field experiences, empirical research, stakeholder feedback, as well as lessons learned from best practices. It is a progressive shift towards a more scientific approach to education. The prescribed structure will help to cater the ability of the child — stages of cognitive development as well as social and physical awareness. The education policy should maintain a symbiotic relationship between the different regions of the country through the study of different languages. The quality of education provided in the country shall be such that it not only delivers basic literacy and numeracy but also creates an analytical environment in the country. The New Education Policy-2020 represents aspirations to become a knowledge powerhouse of the world inculcating the best of the global educational experiments. The global education development agenda reflected



in the Goal 4 (SDG4) of the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development, adopted by India in 2015 — seeks to "ensure inclusive and equitable quality education and promote lifelong learning opportunities for all" by 2030.

Early childhood care and Education (ECCE) is vital for the cognitive development of the students, and this is where the mother tongue becomes crucial. The modern parents are after the western languages including English, French and Spanish. They feel that these languages will help their child in their quest for global recognition. However, one should not forget their mother tongue. The author has witnessed many incidents where a Dogra

family is reluctant to speak in Dogri as they feel inferior. Dogri is one of the 22 official languages recognised by the Government of India. Bodo, Dogri, Maithili and Santhali were recognised and included in the Eighth schedule by the 92nd Amendment act, 2003. National Educational Policy advocates for three languages formula.

Recently, based on the question raised by Vikram Randhawa, MLA in the assembly, The School Education Department has introduced Dogri as the third major language in Government schools up to the primary level, with the Jammu and Kashmir Board of School Education (JKBOSE) developing syllabi, curriculum, and textbooks in Dogri

for classes 1 to 12. While the author had discussion with Sunil Singh, Director, Academics of JK BOSE in a function, there are steps taken in this direction and it will be compulsory subject from class 1 onwards as part of the three-language formula in NEP. The Government is also providing free Dogri textbooks to students in classes 1 and 2 under the district plan. I sincerely feel that it's a right step in the direction to protect Dogri as a language which needs to be sustainable. For secondary classes (9th and 10th), Dogri is being taught as an additional/optional subject, and at the 10+2 stage, it is offered as an elective subject. From here, the Government has to plan under-

graduate programs in Dogri as Major which can actually pave way for the master's and also doctoral programs. Cluster university of Jammu is introducing from 2025-26, Certificate and Diploma programs in Dogri translation. This will eventually help students to find appropriate opportunities.

Dogri needs to be promoted by the Government by asking all those establishments in the Jammu region to put the Dogri language in the display boards. Regular competitions in Dogri will help the students to understand the importance of the language. Cluster university of Jammu organises every year inter collegiate competition called "Yuv Tharang". This year along with existing categories which is being considered for the national entry, Dogri essay competition, Dogri elocution competition, Dogri Music, Dogri cuisine will be added to ensure and promote Dogri across the students and parents' community. The newly introduced MPA program in the university will also give emphasis to Dogri Dance, Dogri Folk music etc. in the proposed National Research Foundation (NRF), there is a need to include Dogri for research purposes and for translational research.

There is a proposed National institute for Pali, Persian and Prakrit in the New Educational Policy. In the similar vein, there could be a National Institute for Dogri which will ensure that the language is protected.

Bhatti Vikramarka reviews ambedkar knowledge tower, Jagjivan Ram hostel projects; emphasises education and social justice

Hyderabad, June 8 (GNS) Deputy Chief Minister Bhatti Vikramarka Mallu stated that the construction of the Ambedkar Knowledge Tower and the Babu Jagjivan Ram Student Hostel would stand as milestones in the welfare initiatives undertaken by the Telangana government, aimed at achieving social justice, educational equality, and the ideals of Dr. B.R. Ambedkar. He emphasized that poverty eradication is possible only through education and that education enables marginalized sections of society to ascend to leadership positions.

On Monday, the Deputy Chief Minister, accompanied by Welfare Minister Adhuri Laxman Kumar, visited the proposed site for the Ambedkar Knowledge Tower

at Lower Tank Bund and the site of the Babu Jagjivan Ram Student Hostel at Nimboli Adda—which is slated for modernization—and held a review meeting with officials. He later spoke to the media. Speaking on the occasion, the Deputy Chief Minister stated that the Ambedkar Knowledge Tower is not merely a structure of brick and cement, but a "temple of knowledge" designed to shape the futures of millions of youths from Dalit, tribal, and backward communities. He outlined plans for the tower—comprising a cellar, a ground floor, and ten additional floors—to house digital libraries, e-learning centers, research wings, coaching centers for competitive exams, conference halls, and



career guidance units.

He noted that the Telangana government has ushered in a digital education revolution, leveraging modern technology to ensure students in rural areas have

opportunities on par with their urban counterparts. He announced that Ambedkar Knowledge Centers would be established in every Assembly constituency headquarters across the state, en-

abling students statewide to access live instruction from expert faculty based in Hyderabad.

He emphasized that the government's goal is to provide free, high-quality

coaching to underprivileged students for competitive examinations—including the Civil Services, Group services, banking, railways, Staff Selection Commission (SSC), and other central and state government jobs. He added that the government is creating a system to provide these advanced opportunities to students right in their own localities, eliminating the need for them to travel to Hyderabad for their education. Referring to the historic student hostel at Nimboliadda, Bhatti Vikramarka remarked that it is not merely a hostel but a living testament to a social history that sheltered the dreams of thousands of underprivileged students. He recalled that students who resided there went on to become

IAS and IPS officers, lawyers, politicians, educationists, and entrepreneurs, serving society in the process.

The Deputy Chief Minister stated that the people's government views welfare not as an expense but as a social investment, moving forward by harmonizing both welfare and development. He noted that the government is demonstrating its commitment through the efficient utilization of SC Sub-Plan funds, the clearance of pending hostel bills, and the development of educational infrastructure.

Welfare Minister Adhuri Laxman Kumar stated that under the leadership of Chief Minister A. Revanth Reddy, a new chapter is being initiated for the educational advancement of Dalit,

Tribal, and weaker sections of society. He announced plans for the construction of the Ambedkar Knowledge Tower at Lower Tank Bund at a cost of approximately 110 crore, and the construction of the Babu Jagjivan Ram student hostel at Nimboliadda—featuring state-of-the-art facilities—at an estimated cost of 25 crore. "It is a moment of great pride in my life that these two historic projects were allocated funds and brought to fruition during my tenure as the Minister for Social Welfare," the Minister stated. He noted that Chief Minister Revanth Reddy has turned the Ambedkar Knowledge Tower project—which had been limited to mere announcements for the past decade—into a reality.

Voter rights forum meets CEO, seeks fair SIR in TG



Hyderabad, June 8 (GNS) An eight-member delegation of retired IAS officers, activists and professors from the Telangana Voter Rights Forum (TVRF) presented a detailed representation on the Special Intensive Revision (SIR) to the state Chief Electoral Officer, C Sudharshan Reddy, on Monday, June 8.

SIR is scheduled to begin on June 25 in Telangana. Booth Level Officers (BLOs) will undertake door-to-door visits to distribute and collect enumeration forms.

The delegation has expressed serious concerns over the electoral process and flagged the possibility of voter deletions for invalid reasons. They urged Reddy to ensure maximum transparency, widespread public awareness, adequate time for verification, easy access to grievance redressal mechanisms, and special safeguards for vulnerable groups, including Dalits, Adivasis, minorities, migrant workers, women and transgender persons, persons with disabilities, students, and other socio-ec-

onomically disadvantaged citizens. The Chief Electoral Officer assured that SIR is being carried out in accordance with Election Commission guidelines, and their representation would be taken into consideration. C Sudharshan Reddy has requested the Telangana police to provide adequate security to BLOs during the field inspections.

He held a video conference attended by Additional CEO Dr Vasam Venkateswar Reddy, Hyderabad Joint Commissioner (Law and Order) Tafseer Iqbal, Greater Hyderabad Municipal Corporation (GHMC) Commissioner and District Election Officer (DEO) RV Karnan, as well as District Collectors, district election and police officers.

Election officials must share the names and contact details of BLOs and supervisors with respective Station House Officers (SHOs) and vice versa. District Election Officers should identify sensitive and vulnerable areas within their jurisdictions and alert the concerned police stations.

Telangana police to collect data on domestic servants from Nepal

Hyderabad, June 8 (GNS) Telangana Director General of Police C.V. Anand on Monday directed officials to collect comprehensive data on domestic servants from Nepal and other countries across the state.

Expressing concern over recent incidents involving individuals from other states, particularly Nepalese employed as domestic workers, he emphasised maintaining a structured database containing details regarding their residence and employment.

Last month, a domestic help from Nepal, along with her associates, killed the wife of a retired IPS officer at their residence in posh Jubilee Hills in Hyderabad and fled with valuables. In another incident, a Nepal-



ese couple working as domestic help, along with their associates, tied up their employer and his wife, sedated them, and fled with 60 tolas of gold, 15 kg of silver and other valuables.

Meanwhile, the DGP has revived the "Staff Officers Meeting", a fortnightly forum for senior officers of the

DGP office and HODs to discuss policies, programmes, and inter-departmental issues. The practice had fallen into disuse, resulting in a visible coordination gap across the wings of the department.

During the meeting, the DGP covered a wide agenda — maintenance of

a structured database of foreign domestic workers for better monitoring and security, CCTNS 2.0, technology-driven policing, and the adoption of AI, drones, and data intelligence systems, etc. He extensively discussed and conducted a detailed review with senior officers and Commission-

ers on the reorganisation of Hyderabad, Cyberabad, Malkajgiri, Future City Commissionerates' jurisdictions, police station limits, border village divisions, and other jurisdiction-related matters. He directed officials to formulate comprehensive plans for the reorganisation of circles, zones, and villages

in a manner that ensures administrative efficiency and operational effectiveness.

The meeting also reviewed the implementation of CCTNS 2.0, strengthening of the police system, modernisation of existing manual processes, and future policing initiatives. It was decided tentatively to organise the Police Retreat in November and the Women Police Conference in October.

To improve gender parity and working conditions for women police personnel, the DGP has advised effective implementation of 33 per cent reservation for women police personnel and directed officers to create greater opportunities for women officers in law & order duties and field-level policing responsibilities.

KTR seeks removal of Dharmendra Pradhan over NEET paper leak

Hyderabad, June 8 (GNS) Bharat Rashtra Samithi (BRS) Working President K.T. Rama Rao (KTR) on Sunday demanded the removal of Union Education Minister Dharmendra Pradhan over the alleged NEET UG paper leak, saying accountability at the highest level was necessary to restore students' confidence in the examination system.

Interacting with NEET aspirants in Hyderabad, KTR described the controversy as a complete failure of the National Testing Agency (NTA) and called for stringent action against those



responsible. "The students should not suffer because of the government's failure. Removing the Union Education Minister will send a strong message that accountability matters," he said. KTR said failure to pun-

ish those responsible would only encourage further negligence within the system. At the same time, he urged students not to lose hope because of the controversy.

"Your anger is justified, but do not let it derail your dreams. Treat this as a speed breaker and prepare for the next examination with renewed determination," he told the aspirants.

Several students who participated in the interaction questioned why candidates should be made to retake the examination when the alleged lapse was on the part of the authorities. Some

also expressed concern that despite strict security measures at examination centres, the paper leak could not be prevented.

Referring to previous controversies surrounding grace marks and unusually high cut-off scores in NEET examinations, KTR said the NTA had failed to provide convincing explanations and had not adequately addressed students' concerns.

He argued that awarding marks through fraudulent means was unfair to deserving candidates and undermined the credibility of the examination process.

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Telangana HC rules HCA chief Amarnath's appointment invalid

Hyderabad, June 8 (GNS) The Telangana High Court on Monday, June 8, ordered the immediate removal of Hyderabad Cricket Association (HCA) president Amarnath from his post, terming his appointment as invalid. The court has directed the HCA secretary, Jeevan Reddy, to appoint a new president by conducting a special annual general meeting.

Amarnath was appointed as president by the Ombudsman Justice after allegations of irregularities in the 2023 elections surfaced. The then president A Jagan Mohan Rao was removed from the post.



Rao had defeated Amarnath by just one vote.

Amarnath challenged the election, claiming Rao had fabricated the nomination papers and disputed that the latter contested from Sri Chakra Cricket Club, which was earlier known as Gowlipura Cricket Club.

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
