Sonam Wangchuk's Fast Enters Day 20, Doctors Flag Health Concerns

New Delhi, July 17 (GNS) Education reform activist Sonam Wangchuk entered the 20th day of his indefinite hunger strike at Jantar Mantar on Friday, with doctors monitoring his health reporting continued weight loss and signs of mild dehydration while stating that he remains mentally alert and under constant medical supervision.

According to the morning medical bulletin issued by Dr. Satish Lamba, General Physician, Medical Superintendent at The Clinics, Hauz Khas, and former Delhi Medical Association (DMA) Secretary, Wangchuk's weight has dropped to around 56.6 kg, reflecting a further decline over the past 24 hours. Medical assessments indicate that he has lost more than nine kilograms since beginning his



fast on June 28. Explaining the physiological effects of prolonged fasting, Dr. Lamba said, "After glucose reserves are exhausted, the body consumes fat. After that, muscles begin to get consumed. His ketone level had reached 3-plus and, after improving hydration, it has come down to 2-plus.

His uric acid is high, which indicates that muscles are being consumed."

The doctor cautioned that the next phase of deterioration could have serious health implications if the fast continues. "The next stage can be alarming. Organs can be impacted. We are keeping him under

24x7 vigilance and hope it does not reach that stage," he said. Appealing for timely intervention, Dr. Lamba added, "I urge the government to intervene as soon as possible because he is a precious gem and we do not want to lose him. If organs get impacted, it can be really alarming for us."

JeM-Linked Module Conducted 8 Explosive Trials: Gujarat ATS

Ahmedabad, July 17 (GNS): A suspected Jaish-e-Mohammed (JeM)-linked module carried out around eight explosive trials at different locations in Gujarat over nearly three years while attempting to perfect improvised explosive device (IED) techniques, the Gujarat Anti-Terrorist Squad (ATS) said on Friday, announcing the arrest of five more suspects in the case and taking the total number of arrests to 3.

The latest arrests came after what the ATS described as intensive interrogation of the eight accused arrested earlier this month in a case registered on July 2 under the Unlawful Activities (Prevention) Act (UAPA) and the Bharatiya Nyaya Sanhita (BNS).

ATS Deputy Inspector General (DIG) Sunil Joshi



said the investigation had uncovered what he described as a local or "indigenous" module that had allegedly been radicalised over several years through extremist literature and social media, rather than acting solely on direct instructions from Pakistani handlers. "Even if everything in the world is going perfectly well, they would

still feel that this is their duty, that this obligation has to be carried out," Joshi said while describing the alleged mindset of the accused. Referring to the alleged radicalisation process, he added: "This local, what you can call an indigenous module... They have been learning by watching social media. They have not been

studying these books just recently; this has been going on for two to three years." According to the ATS, Deputy Superintendent of Police (DySP) Harsh Upadhyay received intelligence that some youths from Banaskantha and Patan districts were in contact with Jaish-e-Mohammed operatives in Pakistan.

Prez Murmu exhorts probationers of Indian forest service to expand greenery

New Delhi, July 17 (GNS): President Droupadi Murmu on Friday described probationers of the Indian Forest Service as custodians of India's natural heritage, exhorting them to focus on increasing forests as these are the foundation of life on Earth.

In an interaction with the probationers, who had called on the President, she said that they are not only administrators of forests but also the custodians of India's natural heritage, as ecological security is integral to the national goal of Viksit Bharat by 2047. She expressed confidence that as Indian Forest Service officers, young officers will play a defining role in ensuring that India's progress remains green, inclusive and sustainable. President Murmu said their role has



become more significant today as the world is facing the challenges of climate change and biodiversity loss. "Forests are central to addressing these challenges. Work of Indian Forest Service officers will therefore contribute not only to India's environmental security but also to global efforts towards sustainable development," she said.

The President said that ecological protection must be harmonised with

the legitimate aspirations of people who live in and around forests. "Development and conservation should not be viewed as opposing goals," said President Murmu, advising young officers to work towards solutions where both nature and communities can thrive together. She urged them to encourage people's participation in conservation, restoration, and sustainable livelihood initiatives.

Chabahar terminal did not face any damage during airstrikes: MEA

New Delhi, July 16 (UNI) The Ministry of External Affairs (MEA) on Friday confirmed that the India-developed Chabahar Port terminal in Iran has not suffered any damage during the recent airstrikes conducted by the United States. Addressing a bi-weekly media briefing in New Delhi on Friday, MEA spokesperson Randhir Jaiwal said that Indian government had seen reports (about the airstrikes) but confirmed that the Chabahar terminal did not suffer any damage.

When asked about US Defence Secretary Pete Hegseth's post about US forces targeting Chabahar and if the airstrikes have impacted operations at the port, Jaiswal responded, "Regarding Chabahar, if you are following the issue, there was a waiver which



was given by the American side that waiver got over some time back. Post that, we have been in discussion with relevant stakeholders as to how to take this particular issue forward. On your question that it was attacked, yes, we have seen some reports in that regard, but we can also tell you that the terminal itself did not face any damage."

Earlier in the day, Hegseth shared on social media an image of a tower appear-

ing to collapse amid repeated airstrikes carried out by the US forces against Iran. He did not attribute the tower or the image to any site. Last October, India had secured a six-month waiver on US sanctions against Iran's Chabahar port, which was valid until April 29.

In May, Iranian Foreign Minister Seyed Abbas Araghchi called Chabahar Port a symbol of cooperation between Iran and India and expressed confidence that the India-developed port will serve as "golden gate" for access to Central Asia, the Caucasus and Europe. Addressing media after the conclusion of the BRICS Foreign Ministers Meeting in New Delhi, Araghchi acknowledged that the development of Chabahar Port has been slowed down due to the US sanctions.

Besides, the government says it can commit in the draft Bill to increase the Lok Sabha seats of every state by 50 per cent.

India’s Crucial Oil Imports From Russia

India will in all possi- bility face a new tariff from the United States of as high as 100% as Trump's new policy to stop Russia's Ukraine war. An economic tool, tariffs are now caught up in Donald Trump's geo-economics. Countries buying oil from Russia are now to be subjected to a 100% duty on all their exports to United States. Even if Chi- na could afford to defy this duty, India could ill-afford such tariffs and, also, in- cur America's wrath.

A new bill to this effect is set on its passage in the US legislature for impos- ing secondary sanctions against Russia to deter the country from executing its war. The proposal provides for imposition of 100% tariff, rather selectively at two countries, India and China, which are the prin- cipal buyers of Russian oil. The combined purchases of China and India, run- ning into billions of dol- lars, have in a way bailed out Russia in its execution of war. Starved of the oil revenues, Russian war ef- fort could collapse in no time. Russia is vulnerable to oil revenues for funding its efforts as its economy has otherwise shrunk. With the war going on for over three years, Russia faces multiple problems. Direct military costs are estimated at around \$300 billion, according to a report by CNN. Besides, Russian assets held out- side the country running into billions, lie frozen



with h western nations.

Many in the west have proposed to even start drawing down these fro- zen reserves to fund re- construction of war rav- aged Ukraine. These funds lie far out of reach of Rus- sia. Sanctions on Rus- sian banks have severely limited shadow transac- tions in Russian oils with other countries. Besides, the heat casualties in the Ukraine war and demand for more troops on the grounds have depleted the manpower base for the Russian economy. The drawing of manpower for deployment has been so damaging that freed crim- inals from Russian jails have been inducted into the fighting force.

Later still, Russian is bringing in troops from abroad for fighting in Ukraine. North Koreans

as well as others from di- verse countries, including China, have been spot- ted and sometimes held in Ukraine. The draft on fight age population have started telling on supply of workers in the Russian factories. This has been particularly deep in the war related manufactur- ing industries, thus in turn, crippling civilian industries. Russia had banked on the United States moving away from Ukraine in its support and the sharp division be- tween the NATO allies in Europe, on the one hand, and America on the other. However, the last round of NATO consultations have turned the tide of events.

America, frustrated with Russian president, Vladi- mir Putin's intransigence, has turned full circles. Pres- ident Trump had expressed

his frustration with Putin and his double play. He has commented; “Putin speaks nice in the formal talks and then bombs everyone in the evening”. Trump had spoken to Putin directly several occasions and Pu- tin had escalated his war and attacks immediately thereafter. Seeing that di- plomacy is not working, Trump is turning to arms twisting of Russia now. He is now resuming supplies of American arms through NATO allies and then fol- lowing up with secondary economic sanctions which could hurt the Russian economy.

It will be on China now to back up Russia. In recent interactions with EU lead- ers, Chinese foreign min- ister had indicated that it could not witness Rus- sia losing in Ukraine war. China has been playing its

hidden hand of unquali- fied support for Russia. However, this would come to a test now that America and the west are unified over Ukraine support and could launch some crip- pling blows to Russia. The present instance apart, America is using tariffs as a weapon of economic warfare ever since Trump entered his second presi- dency. On again, off again, Trump has been declaring against select countries ever since he got back to power. Since Trump came back into the White House and have been playing his tariff threats, American economy is going through a turmoil. The markets are in a state of flux, with the volatility indices swing- ing wildly. Trump had to postpone his tariffs several times in the light of finan- cial market swings.

New Education Policy and Dogri Language

India has about 1200 uni- versities, around 50000 col- leges which are now offering about 26 percent of GER. About 300 million students are studying in colleges and about 40 million in univer- sities. Since 1948, we had multiple committees on education and last of it was in 2017-19 under Dr Kasturi Rangan. This paved way for the New Education Policy in 2020. The New Education Policy- 2020 aims to facili- tate an inclusive, participa- tory and holistic approach, which takes into consid- eration field experiences, empirical research, stake- holder feedback, as well as lessons learned from best practices.It is a progressive shift towards a more scien- tific approach to education. The prescribed structure will help to cater the abil- ity of the child – stages of cognitive development as well as social and physical awareness. The education policy should maintain a symbiotic relationship be- tween the different regions of the country through the study of different languages. The quality of education provided in the country shall be such that it not only delivers basic literacy and numeracy but also cre- ates an analytical environ- ment in the country.The New Education Policy-2020 represents aspirations to become a knowledge pow- erhouse of the world incul- cating the best of the global educational experiments. The global education de- velopment agenda reflected



in the Goal 4 (SDG4) of the 2030 Agenda forSustainable Development, adopted by India in 2015 – seeks to “en- sure inclusive and equitable quality education and pro- mote lifelong learning op- portunities for all” by 2030.

Early childhood care and Education (ECCE) is vital for the cognitive develop- ment of the students, and this is where the mother tongue becomes crucial. The modern parents are af- ter the western languages including English, French and Spanish. They feel that these languages will help their child in their quest for global recognition. How- ever, one should not forget their mother tongue. The author has witnessed many incidents where a Dogra

family is reluctant to speak in Dogri as they feel inferior. Dogri is one of the 22 official languages recognised by the Government of India. Bodo, Dogri, Maithili and Santhali were recognised and includ- ed in the Eighth schedule by the 92nd Amendment act, 2003. National Educational Policy advocates for three languages formula.

Recently, based on the question raised by Vikram Randhawa, MLA in the as- sembly, The School Educa- tion Department has in- troduced Dogri as the third major language in Govern- ment schools up to the pri- mary level, with the Jam- mu and Kashmir Board of School Education (JKBOSE) developing syllabi, curricu- lum, and textbooks in Dogri

for classes 1 to 12. While the author had discussion with Sunil Singh, Director, Academics of JK BOSE in a function, there are steps taken in this direction and it will be compulsory subject from class 1 onwards as part of the three-language for- mula in NEP. The Govern- ment is also providing free Dogri textbooks to students in classes 1 and 2 under the district plan. I sincerely feel that it's a right step in the direction to protect Dogri as a language which needs to be sustainable. For second- ary classes (9th and 10th), Dogri is being taught as an additional/optional sub- ject, and at the 10+2 stage, it is offered as an elective subject. From here, the Gov- ernment has to plan under-

graduate programs in Dogri as Major which can actually pave way for the master's and also doctoral programs. Cluster university of Jammu is introducing from 2025-26, Certificate and Diploma programs in Dogri transla- tion. This will eventually help students to find appro- priate opportunities.

Dogri needs to be pro- moted by the Government by asking all those establish- ments in the Jammu region to put the Dogri language in the display boards. Regular competitions in Dogri will help the students to under- stand the importance of the language. Cluster university of Jammu organises every year inter collegiate competi- tion called “Yuv Tharang”. This year along with existing categories which is being considered for the national entry, Dogri essay competi- tion, Dogri elocution com- petition, Dogri Music, Dogri cuisine will be added to ensure and promote Dogri across the students and par- ents’ community. The newly introduced MPA program in the university will also give emphasis to Dogri Dance, Dogri Folk music etc. in the proposed National Research Foundation (NRF), there is a need to include Dogri for research purposes and for translational research.

There is a proposed National institute for Pali, Persian and Prakrit in the New Educational Policy. In the similar vein, there could be a National Insti- tute for Dogri which will ensure that the language is protected.

Courts to shed delays, reduce vacations and embrace reform

The Central Government’s intention to reduce the volume of court cases should be warmly welcomed. After all, 70 per cent of cases in the courts of the country involve the Govern- ments, whether at the Centre or in the States. On the other hand, speeding up the hearing of cases and the passing of judgments also need to be expedited. The amount of time spent on each matter too needs to be recorded.

This is perhaps not being done, and if that is the case, it is certainly not published, as it may embarrass some of the judges as well as advocates. Adjournments are the main cause of delays, and delays are the bane of justice. They are often used as tactics to slow down or even snuff out the progress of the hearings. At times, they are sought because the leading advocate of one or the other side is busy in another case in another court —maybe even in another city.

For the ensuing waste of the court’s time, a repeat court fee of, say, 50 per cent of the initial amount should be charged to the side that seeks the adjournment. When the client is debited for this fee, he would learn a lesson not to engage an advocate who is so busy as to be distracted by several other cases. The freedom to appeal upwards, again and again, should be reduced. Some matters which began in a small cases court in, say, Mumbai have reached the apex court. Normally, one appeal to each side may be permitted. In special cir- cumstances, perhaps two could be considered.

Before a hearing begins in a matter, the judge should, in consultation with both the advo- cates, decide how much time each of them would be given. If either side exceeds their limit, they should have to pay extra fees — rather like in a journey by a taxi. Why should the court waste its time merely because an advocate is slow to think or express themselves, or keeps repeating themselves? As a layman, I am surprised that the litigant has to begin by submit- ting, usually, a lengthy affidavit.

On the night before the first hearing, the judge reads and digests all that has been stated in that affidavit. In the hearing, the advocate verbally explains to the judge and the oppos- ing advocate what is written in the affidavit. Is this not a repetitive procedure? Surely, it can be cut down? Once, I happened to get a chance to read an opinion on a matter by a Kolkata advocate as well as a London lawyer. I was surprised to see that the UK draft was written in about 300 words while the Indian one was longer, at over a thousand words. For us Indians, writing in English has not been the soul of wit. Since a great deal of legal work is written, this becomes an important area of check. Incidentally, judgments or orders are not always brief or terse.

And what about the working hours of the courts themselves — or, more accurately, the duration of the court machinery? While one does not wish to be uncharitable, their Lord- ships across the country’s courts taking off for vacations has begun becoming the topic of much talk. In a country whose justice system is clogged with pending cases whose number runs into a few crores, such judicial holidays need a relook. It is important to bear in mind that these longish and regular vacations for judges and senior lawyers is a practice from the British days — a period when there was no air-conditioning. The summer of the In- dian plains was simply unbearable for most judges, and long vacations in the hill stations of Simla, Darjeeling, Ooty, or the cold valley of Kashmir was understandable — but not in today’s age, when technology has made it possible to overcome many challenges of nature.

The present hours of work in the country’s courtrooms too are not encouraging, as far as utilisation of both time and manpower are concerned. Most courts begin their proceedings at 10:30 or thereabouts and conclude at 16:30 — i.e., working for six hours, but effectively five, because there is an hour off for lunch. Saturdays and Sundays are not counted here. With overburdened judges and a mountain of cases piling up by the day, it is high time a shift system was introduced in the judiciary. There is no reason why courts cannot work in shifts, reducing the workload on the judges and advocates, plus ensuring more employment opportunities for many unemployed lawyers and other associated staff.

There are many advocates in the country who stand to gain by such a measure in the form of making the law and thereby, the country’s legal system — accessible to the lower rungs of society.

The latter point is too obvious to bear iteration here. The then Chief Justice of India, Y K Sabharwal, had in 2006 not mooted the idea of courts needing to work in dual shifts in order to reduce the workload. The accessibility of justice to the common folk of the country has to become the topmost priority for judicial reforms in the country.

Generative Artificial Intelligence (GenAI) is a tout word nowadays, as it is considered as future technology. GenAI is revolutionizing every sector of society.With its capacity to gen- erate human-like text, images, audio, and video at scale, GenAI has brought both unprec- edented opportunities and complex challenges for the society. Trending tools of GenAI like ChatGPT and Google Gemini can now perform tasks that were once done by humans only like drafting articles, summarizing data, and producing multimedia content.Given the in- creasing integration of artificial intelligence (AI) into various domains, it is also being widely used in media and journalism sector. The advent of GenAI marks a pivotal turning point for journalism. GenAI automates and augments traditional tasks, the journalist's value propo- sition is moving from being a mere content creator to a critical thinker and innovator.For decades, the journey of a news story has been a laborious, linear process. A journalist identi- fies a story, conducts interviews, transcribes conversations, sifts through mountains of data, drafts the article, and then works with editors to polish it for publication. Each step is a time- consuming, human-driven endeavor. GenAI is poised to disrupt this entire workflow. News organizations like The Associated Press and Reuters are already using AI to generate routine content, such as sports recaps and financial reports, from structured data. This automation frees human journalists from the tedious, repetitive tasks that have long been a part of their job. Even though GenAI can assist with translation, transcription, fact-checking, investiga- tive research and analysis of vast datasets, still it requires human supervision and oversight. As the same tools that enhance productivity also pose existential risks. Deepfakes, AI-gener- ated misinformation, and synthetic content blur the line between reality and fabrication.A study on three media organisations in The Netherlands and Denmark highlighted some of these challenges of usingGenAI in media organisations. These challenges include incompe- tence of editorial judgment, possibility for algorithm bias, inaccuracy, and the trepidation of loss of journalistic autonomy. Keeping in mind the growing ethical issues of using GenAI, some Arabian countries like Egypt, Syria,Libya, Bahrain, Sudan, and Yemen have banned the use of GenAI for journalists. While on the other hand, many developed countries like USA, UK and China are continuously promoting GenAI in their workflows. India is also pro- moting the use of GenAI as the government has recently launched the National AI Mission, with the vision to become a world leader in AI.

Many people are increasingly concerned that GenAI could eventually replace humans in the field of journalism and media. This fear has intensified with the recent launch of AI- powered news anchors in countries like China, India, and South Korea. These AI anchors can deliver news 24/7 in multiple languages without breaks, errors, or salaries, challenging the traditional role of human broadcasters. As GenAI tools become more sophisticated, capable of writing articles, analyzing data, and even simulating interviews, the boundary between machine-generated and human journalism continues to blur. Critics argue that while AI may enhance efficiency, it risks stripping journalism of its human touch, empa- thy, and ethical judgment. The rise of synthetic news presenters (AI Avatars) has created a broader anxiety among journalists and other stakeholders over the speculations that cost-cutting media organizations may prioritize automation over authenticity, reducing opportunities for real journalists and weakening the critical human elements that build trust and credibility in news reporting. But many believe that GenAI cannot replicate the core human elements of journalism. AI cannot build the trust required for a sensitive in- terview with a human source. It cannot exercise the nuanced judgment needed to decide which facts are most relevant to a story. It cannot feel empathy for a community affected by a tragedy or understand the cultural context that gives a story its full meaning. These are the inherently human qualities that will define a journalist's enduring values. The role is evolving from a purveyor of information to a trusted sense-maker—someone who can cut through the automated content, verify what is real, provide context.

India-EFTA free trade pact to come into effect from October 1: Piyush Goyal

Mumbai, July 17 (GNS): Union Commerce Minister Piyush Goyal said on Saturday that the Trade and Economic Partnership Agreement (TEPA) between India and the European Free Trade Association (EFTA) will officially come into effect on October 1, that would facilitate the creation of 1 million direct jobs in India.

EFTA comprises Iceland, Liechtenstein, Norway, and Switzerland. The landmark pact, signed on March 10, 2024, is likely to unlock huge foreign direct investment (FDI) and deepen trade and economic co-operation across several sectors. “India-EFTA TEPA to come into effect from 1st October,” the minister posted on X. EFTA nations have committed an investment of \$100 billion, which would help create 1 million direct jobs in India. A dedicated India-EFTA Desk has been launched to



promote trade, investment, and business partnerships. Goyal said the desk will act as a 'single-window platform' for both governments and private companies. The India-EFTA deal includes \$50 billion in FDI within the first 10 years; an additional \$50 billion over the next 5 years; and generation of 1 million direct jobs in India. TEPA marks one of India's most comprehensive trade pacts and is expected to open up premium European markets for Indian exporters while bringing

in capital, innovation, and jobs. As part of the pact, EFTA is offering 92.2 per cent of its tariff lines which covers 99.6 per cent of India's exports to the region. The EFTA's market access offer covers 100 per cent of non-agri products and tariff concession on Processed Agricultural Products (PAP). Under the agreement, India is offering 82.7 per cent of its tariff lines which covers 95.3 per cent of EFTA exports of which more than 80 per cent import is gold. The effective duty on

gold remains untouched. Sensitivity related to PLI in sectors such as pharma, medical devices and processed food etc. have been taken while extending offers. Sectors such as dairy, soya, coal and sensitive agricultural products are kept in the exclusion list. As part of the pact, domestic customers will get access to high-quality Swiss products, such as watches, chocolates, biscuits, and clocks, at lower prices as India will phase out customs duties under the trade pact on these goods over 10 years.

India's agri-exports surge in Q1 FY26, rice exports lead

New Delhi, July 17 (GNS): India's exports of agricultural and processed foods got off to a great start in FY26, growing 7 per cent year-on-year to \$5.96 billion in the April-June quarter (Q1 FY26). The centre-piece of India's agricultural exports is still rice. The shipments of both non-basmati and basmati rice increased by 3.5 per cent to \$2.9 billion in Q1. This comes after rice exports in FY25 reached a record \$12.47 billion, a 20 per cent increase over the previous fiscal year, as per official data. For more than 10 years, India has maintained its position as the world's largest rice exporter, accounting for 40 per cent of the global rice trade, as per industry data. The surge follows the government's decision to remove export controls, including the minimum export price, in late 2024 in response to abundant



stock and record harvests, the reports highlighted. In Q1, buffalo meat, dairy, and poultry exports grew by a strong 17 per cent to \$1.18 billion. According to reports, India has established itself as the world's second-largest exporter of buffalo meat, with important markets in Saudi Arabia, the United Arab Emirates, Vietnam, Malaysia, Egypt, and Iraq. Through certified integrated meat plants, which are routinely inspected by importing countries to guarantee adherence to international standards, APEDA coordinates these exports. In the meantime,

exports of fruits and vegetables increased by 13 per cent to \$0.95 billion, indicating a rise in the demand for Indian produce worldwide. Meanwhile, products under the APEDA (Agricultural and Processed Food Products Export Development Authority) umbrella contributed significantly to the export surge, the report stated. In FY25, APEDA-coordinated exports reached \$25.14 billion, up 12 per cent from FY24. These products now account for 51 per cent of India's total agricultural exports, with the remainder comprising marine products, tobacco, coffee, and tea.

RBL Bank's Q1 net profit falls 46 pc YoY to Rs 200 crore

Mumbai, July 17 (GNS): RBL Bank on Saturday posted a net profit of Rs 200 crore for the first quarter of current financial year (Q1 FY26), down 46 per cent year-on-year (YoY), the private sector lender said in an exchange filing. The bank had posted Rs 371.5 crore profit in corresponding quarter a year ago (Q1 FY25). However, the private bank saw a strong rebound sequentially from the Rs 69 crore reported in Q4 FY25. Meanwhile, the bank's total standalone income stood at Rs 4,510 crore, marginally higher than Rs 4,475.6 crore recorded in Q4 FY25. At the same time, interest income remained steady at Rs 3,441 crore, while non-interest income, which includes fees, commissions, forex earnings, and investment gains rose to Rs 1,069 crore from Rs 1,000 crore in the preceding quarter. Operating profit before provisions came in at Rs



New Delhi, July 17 (GNS): Industry 4.0 is being considered for future incorporation into the Central Public Sector Enterprise (CPSE) MoU assessment framework, and that early adoption will be key to enhancing global competitiveness, the government has said. In a strategic step towards fostering innovation and smart manufacturing, the Department of Public Enterprises (DPE), Ministry of Finance, organised a workshop on Industry 4.0 here, which brought together experts, policymakers, and leadership of CPSEs to discuss strategies for adoption

and scaling up of Industry 4.0 technologies across sectors like Energy, Power, Construction, Infrastructure, Telecom and Services. K. Moses Chalai, Secretary, Department of Public Enterprises, emphasised the importance of embracing the Fourth Industrial Revolution (4IR) as a national mission. In his address, Chalai underscored the need for a “Whole-of-CPSEs” (WoC) approach on the lines of the “Whole-of-Government” framework urging all CPSEs to collaborate in integrating 4IR enablers such as Artificial Intelligence (AI), Internet of

Things (IoT), Digital Twins, 3D Printing, and 5G-enabled smart infrastructure into their operations. As part of expert presentations at the workshop, A. Anand, a deployment expert, shared rich experience in applications and field deployment of Digital Designing, Reverse Engineering, and 3D Printing across industry verticals, drawing from India's first 5G Labs and 3D Printing Centres of Excellence. Dr. Prabhjot Singh Sugga, Associate Professor at SPA, highlighted the transformative potential of Digital Twin platforms in infrastructure, plant man-

agement, and disaster resilience and Vidushi Chaturvedi, an AI expert, spoke on leveraging Artificial Intelligence and Machine Learning for predictive analytics, resource optimisation, and intelligent decision-making. The DPE reiterated its commitment to support CPSEs in leveraging Industry 4.0 for operational excellence and sustainable development. The workshop marks a significant step toward realising this vision through collective efforts and strategic implementation across the CPSE ecosystem, according to the government.

HDFC Bank clocks 13 pc sequential drop in Q1 net profit, announces Rs 5 special dividend

New Delhi, July 17 (GNS): HDFC Bank on Saturday reported a 13 per cent sequential drop in net profit (unaudited consolidated) for Q1 FY26 at 16,257.91 crore, down from Rs 18,834.88 crore in the previous quarter that ended on March 31. On the year-on-year basis, India's largest private lending bank registered a marginal dip of 1.3 per cent in net profit from 16,474.85 crore it clocked in Q1 FY25 (after accounting for minority interest). The bank earned an interest income of Rs 77,470 crore, which was up 6 per cent from Rs 73,033 crore reported in the corresponding quarter of the last financial year. HDFC Bank's interest expenses reached Rs 46,032.23 crore during the review period, compared to Rs 43,196 crore in the previous year, marking a rise of 6.6 per cent. According to the exchange filing, the net interest income

(the difference between interest earned and interest expended) for the quarter ending June 30, 2025, increased by 5.4 per cent to Rs 31,439 crore, up from Rs 29,839 crore for the quarter ending June 30, 2024. HDFC Bank announced issuance of first-ever bonus shares in the proportion of 1:1 which means one equity share for every 1 fully paid-up equity share, each held by the members of the bank as on the record date of August 27. The bank also announced a special interim dividend of Rs 5 per equity share for FY 2025-26. “The Special Interim Dividend shall be paid to the eligible Members on Monday, August 11, 2025,” the HDFC bank said in its stock exchange filing. The gross non-performing asset (GNPA) ratio stood at 1.40 per cent, while the net NPA ratio was 0.47 per cent as of June 30, both slightly higher than the year-ago levels.

Critical mineral-rich northeast offers a massive opportunity for India

New Delhi, July 17 (GNS): Long treated as a remote corner of the country, the northeastern region is becoming a frontrunner in several fields amid a mega infrastructure drive, and the mineral-rich states are now receiving focused attention to transform untapped resources into drivers of economic growth, employment, and local empowerment. This is crucial as the world races towards clean energy, making critical minerals such as lithium, cobalt, rare earths, graphite and vanadium, among others. The government recently announced that northeast is home to several critical minerals, including lithium, cobalt, chromium, rare earths, graphite, and vanadium. The National Mineral Exploration Trust's ongoing survey has identified 38 blocks in the region, and seven have been cleared for auction. Critical minerals are essential to semiconductors,



smartphones, servers, precision tools, telecom equipment, medical electronics, batteries, and clean energy, among others. These inputs underpin industrial strength and national resilience. Global supply chains remain vulnerable due to geopolitical concentration and strategic trade controls and a focused national mission was both timely and necessary. Recently-concluded ‘North-East Mining Ministers’ Conclave’ in Guwahati underlined the Centre's commitment to strengthen

mining infrastructure, fast-track project approvals, and promote sustainable mining practices in the northeastern region. The development of the northeast is central to the vision of Viksit Bharat 2047, with the eight states — Assam, Arunachal Pradesh, Manipur, Meghalaya, Mizoram, Nagaland, Tripura, and Sikkim — rightfully celebrated as Ashta Lakshmi. India's mineral auction framework has gained strong momentum in recent months. Since FY2024-25, a total of 283 mineral blocks

have been put up for auction by the State and Central Governments. Of these, 161 mineral blocks have been successfully auctioned, bringing the cumulative tally to 515. This includes five mineral blocks from Assam and four critical mineral blocks from Arunachal Pradesh, opening new avenues for industrial growth and employment in the region. These auctions underscore the readiness of the North-East to play a central role in India's critical mineral strategy, while also reflecting the government's commitment to transparency and competitiveness in resource allocation. India holds 8 per cent of the world's rare earth element reserves, which gives it the potential of playing a key role in the gradually evolving global supply landscape as China's current dominance is projected to decline, according to a recent CareEdge report.

Nearly 76,000 Indian startups now led by women: Minister

New Delhi, July 17 (GNS): Around 76,000 startups in India today are women-led and a large number of them from tier 2 and 3 cities, Union Minister Dr Jitendra Singh said on Saturday. The minister said that India's path to becoming a developed nation by 2047 will be led by empowered women and youth, as envisioned by Prime Minister Narendra Modi under the paradigm of women-led development. Addressing a conference here, Dr Singh stated that over the last 11 years, the PM Modi government has focused its governance architecture around four pillars — the Poor, Farmers, Youth, and Women. “Women-centric governance has not only empowered individuals, but reshaped society. What began as targeted welfare has now evolved into institutional leadership,” he told the gathering. The minister launched the Jeevika



E-Learning Management System App, aimed at providing accessible learning for women, and unveiled the publication titled “Shashakt Mahila, Samridh Bihar”, which celebrates women's contributions to Bihar's progress. Dr Singh elaborated on the PM Modi government's structured and comprehensive approach to women empowerment, built across four key pillars. The first phase, Access and Inclusion in Institutions, marked a

historic shift in India's educational and military landscape. The second phase, Scientific and Technological Empowerment, has empowered women through targeted schemes such as WISE (Women in Science and Engineering), GATI (Gender Advancement for Transforming Institutions), CURIE, and the Women Scientist Programme. The third phase, Economic and Social Empowerment, has witnessed a massive scale-up of wom-

en's access to financial resources. Over 48 crore Jan Dhan accounts have been opened for women, while more than 60 per cent of Mudra Yojana beneficiaries are women entrepreneurs. The creation of over 3 crore ‘Lakshpati Didis’ through Self-Help Groups (SHGs) is transforming rural economies. Under the Pradhan Mantri Awas Yojana, homes registered in women's names are providing not just shelter but also financial and social dignity.

Telangana cabinet seeks centre aid over rainfall deficit, orders dharani probe

Hyderabad, July 17 (GNS): With Telangana facing a rainfall deficit of about 40 per cent due to the impact of El Niño, the State government has decided to request the Centre to send special teams to assess the situation and provide necessary financial assistance for implementing contingency plans. The decision was taken in the Cabinet meeting presided over by Chief Minister A. Revanth Reddy here on Friday.

Minister for Revenue, Information & Public Relations Ponguleti Srinivas Reddy told media persons that the Cabinet decided to write to the Central government regarding the prevailing rainfall deficit and the impact of El Niño in the state. The letter will comprehensively detail

the impact on crop cultivation and allied agricultural sectors, challenges related to drinking and irrigation water, and the plight of agricultural labourers. Chief Minister A. Revanth Reddy directed officials to immediately prepare alternative action plans concerning drinking water, irrigation, agriculture, and power supply.

He instructed all departments to be prepared with proactive measures, given the Meteorological Department's warnings that the situation could worsen in the coming days. The Cabinet decided that District Collectors must remain vigilant to prevent any drinking water shortages, take appropriate measures, and respond promptly to public grievances.



It was decided to ensure an uninterrupted power supply without any load shedding. Officials were directed to make arrangements for both power generation and procurement to meet this requirement. The Cabinet also decided to prioritise the allocation of available water from all projects for drinking water needs. The Cabinet appealed to farmers to avoid cultivating water intensive crops and

instead opt for low water intensity crops. It decided to conduct awareness seminars and meetings across the state regarding the impact of El Niño. It directed that the public be widely informed about the prevailing rainfall deficit, available water resources, and the precautions farmers need to take. The Cabinet directed that a special report on the impact of El Niño on the agricultural sector be

prepared by agricultural experts and scientists under the leadership of State Planning Board Vice Chairman Chinna Reddy. It requested a report covering crops suitable for current conditions, precautions for farmers, and measures for the care of livestock alongside crops.

The Cabinet decided to hold emergency review meetings to assess ground level conditions in all districts and determine immediate actions. It resolved to conduct special review meetings on Monday (July 20) for each combined district, led by the respective district ministers and involving local public representatives and officials. It was decided to assign these responsibilities to a senior IAS officer alongside the in charge minister for each district. The State Cabinet resolved that all de-

partments must be prepared to navigate this natural challenge, continuously review the situation, and coordinate to overcome the crisis caused by the rainfall deficit.

The State Cabinet also approved the formation of a Special Investigation Team (SIT) to conduct a comprehensive investigation into irregularities and malpractices related to land records and land transactions conducted through the Dharani portal during the BRS rule.

The Dharani portal came into effect on October 29, 2020. The Cabinet has decided to conduct an in depth examination of all suspicious transactions that have taken place in the state since then, including land registrations, record alterations, and the

transfer of agricultural, assigned, and govt lands. The govt has already identified over 10,000 suspicious transactions through a forensic audit. Consequently, the Cabinet decided to conduct a comprehensive review of digital records, login details, record modifications, official approvals, changes in land classification, and beneficiary details related to these land transactions. The Cabinet also decided to investigate the role of Infrastructure Leasing & Financial Services Limited (IL&FS), which managed the Dharani portal, as well as issues related to the selection of the operating agency, the tender process, contract allocation, portal design, system architecture, and data security flaws.

Kishan Reddy Hails Semicon 2.0 Initiative

Hyderabad, July 17 (GNS): Central Minister for Coal and Mines G Kishan Reddy on Friday hailed the union Cabinet's approval of the 'Semicon 2.0' programme, saying the Rs 1.27 lakh crore initiative would transform India into a global semiconductor manufacturing and design hub while strengthening the country's self-reliance in electronics.



policy, noting that the Centre has provided Rs 724 crore for Electronic Manufacturing Clusters (EMCs) in the state, besides incentives exceeding Rs 1,000 crore for the electronics sector. He urged the state government to formulate a strategy to attract semiconductor fabrication units, ATMP facilities, design centres and research institutions. Kishan Reddy said Semicon 2.0 would focus on chip design, fabrication, advanced research, packaging, machinery, materials and talent development, while Semicon 1.0 had already trained 68,000 students across 315 universities, including several premier institutions in Telangana.

Calling it a golden opportunity for Telangana's youth, he urged them to acquire advanced skills in chip design, semiconductor manufacturing, fabrication and packaging to tap emerging global employment and startup opportunities under the Viksit Bharat 2047 vision.

They distributed health cards to the employees and launched the NEHS portal at the event held at the State Secretariat. They said that the scheme is aimed at providing quality, accessible, and affordable healthcare through cashless treatment through an expanded network of empanelled hospitals, enhanced transparency, and a seamless digital platform.



This scheme would benefit approximately 8 lakh govt employees and pensioners, along with 29.80 lakh of their dependant family members. Employees can avail free in-patient medical services at 886 private network hospitals across the state. The scheme covers 1,816 types of medical treatments and

surgeries, aligned with the Central Government Health Scheme (CGHS) package rates. The govt has formed a special Trust with equal participation from government officials and representatives of employee unions to ensure the scheme operates transparently and smoothly, the Deputy Chief Minister said. He stated that

Rajendranagar Fertilizer Lab Gets NABL Accreditation

Consequently, quality testing of fertilizers supplied to farmers will be conducted with greater accuracy and reliability. The Rajendranagar FCO laboratory successfully implemented ISO/IEC 17025:2017 standards and demonstrated technical competence meeting international benchmarks for the chemical analysis of fertilizers. Among the nine quality control laboratories (covering



fertilizers, seeds, and pesticides) operating under the Telangana Agriculture Department, the Rajendranagar FCO laboratory is the first to secure NABL accreditation. Currently, the laboratory has received NABL accreditation for quality testing of Muriate of

Potash (MoP) and Single Super Phosphate (SSP – both powder and granular) fertilizers. This accreditation is a matter of pride for the Telangana government and the Agriculture Department. This development further strengthens the government's objective of

providing quality agricultural inputs to farmers. It will play a pivotal role in bolstering the state's quality control system and instilling confidence among farmers regarding the quality of fertilizers. The NABL accreditation secured by the Rajendranagar FCO (Fertilizer Control Order) laboratory marks the beginning of a phased process to obtain similar accreditation for other agricultural quality control laboratories across the state. This achievement underscores the government's commitment to farmer welfare, the strengthening of the agricultural sector, and the provision of quality agricultural services by upgrading all state laboratories to meet international standards.
