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CM directs Indiramma Houses to be built within residential areas in Hyderabad



Hyderabad, Jul 24 (GNS): Emphasising that houses located far from residential localities could remain unoccupied due to livelihood constraints, Revanth Reddy said the flats should be built close to workplaces to ensure that the urban poor continue to have access to jobs and essential services. Officials informed the Chief Minister that land had already been identified in several constituencies. He directed them to expedite the process of identifying additional unused government land for the project. The government plans to construct Indiramma flats with a total area of about 528 sq ft, including a 400 sq ft carpet area. Each unit is estimated to cost around Rs 11 lakh, of which the government will provide a subsidy of Rs 5 lakh and bear the entire land cost, while beneficiaries will contribute the remaining Rs 6 lakh. In the first phase, 7,680 flats will be constructed across 17 Assembly constituencies, including Rajendranagar, Maheshwaram, Serilingampally, Ibrahimpatnam, Malkajgiri, Nampally, Khairatabad, Jubilee Hills, Karwan, Bahadurpura, Amberpet, Kukatpally, Medchal, Quthbullapur, Sanathnagar, Secunderabad Cantonment and Malakpet. Ministers Ponguleti Srinivas Reddy and Ponnambam Prabhakar, senior officials, including DGP C.V. Anand, and representatives of the Housing, Revenue and HMDA departments attended the review meeting, according to an official statement.

Centre, CJP hold fresh talks over NEET row



New Delhi, July 24 (UNI): “Talks happened in a cordial atmosphere. We heard their grievances in detail,” he added. The CJP, on the other hand, remained adamant and refused to budge on its demand for the resignation of Education Minister Dharmendra Pradhan. “The govt has sought time till tomorrow afternoon on our demand for Dharmendra Pradhan’s resignation. They have agreed on the two demands — one of compensation for families of NEET aspirants who died by suicide and withdrawal of legal cases on students,” CJP’s Ashutosh Ranka told the media. This was round two of the Centre-CJP talks and came a day after Dr Jitendra Singh’s appeal for discussions to end the stalemate. The Minister of State in the PMO, while making an appeal to the CJP on Thursday, said that the government’s doors are open for talks 24/7 and the protesting group could decide the time and hours of discussion as per their convenience.

Himachal landslide kills 13, including infant

Shimla, July 24 (UNI): A massive landslide of rocks dislocated from a mountain hit a Tata Sumo with 15 people onboard in Himachal Pradesh’s remote, rugged Pangi Valley in Lahaul-Spiti district on Friday, killing 13 people, including a six-month-old infant. The area has been witnessing heavy rainfall for the past many days. The vehicle caught fire after it came under debris of the mountain that collapsed near Karunallah on the Udaipur-Pangi road.

Rahul Gandhi alleges pellet gun use on students

New Delhi, July 24 (GNS): Scaling up his attack on the students’ stir, Leader of the Opposition (LoP) in Lok Sabha Rahul Gandhi on Friday accused the Centre of “speaking lies” over the alleged use of pellet guns on students protesting under the banner of the Cockroach Janta Party (CJP) at Jantar Mantar. Rahul, with pellet gun victim Sahil by his side, claimed that the latter suffered grievous injuries in the police crackdown during the CJP’s ‘Chalo Sansad’ march on July 20, asserting that pellet guns were used to crush peaceful dissent.

Showing his injuries to the press, Rahul said this was “visual proof” of a brazen crackdown on students and demanded that the Centre, rather than deflecting, come clean on the issue. “The government has been denying that pellets were fired. But here is the proof,” said the Congress MP while lifting the victim’s T shirt to show alleged pel-

let wounds on his face, right arm and upper body. Pellets allegedly hit the 19 year old Sahil during Monday’s protest march and subsequently treated in hospital, having suffered injuries to his eye. Rahul, intensifying his tirade against the Centre, claimed that pellets were fired at Sahil when he was waving the Tricolour and

demanding his rights as a student. “Pellets hit my brother while he was waving the national flag. He cannot see from his right eye as pellets have hit it. There is uncertainty over whether he will regain his vision,” he told reporters. He said the peaceful protest, despite attempts to crush it, remains steadfast

in its goal and purpose. The alleged use of pellet guns during the clampdown has snowballed into a major controversy, with concerns raised about police excesses in quelling the protests. The firing of pellets, allegedly by Rapid Action Force (RAF) personnel, has called for deeper scrutiny of the force’s handling of public

demonstrations. The force is understood to have initiated a verification exercise into the allegations, with multiple reports pointing to pellet use during the Delhi stir. Rahul, further speaking to the press, reiterated students’ and the Opposition bloc’s demands, which include removing the Education Minister, taking action against those who inflicted injuries on students, and an apology from Prime Minister Narendra Modi, affirming that their demands remain firm and non negotiable. Rallying behind the students, he said they have been on the streets for demands that are rightfully their own, but the government was being “insensitive and intolerant.” Repeating calls for the ouster of the minister, he said: “The man who is responsible for the education system must be sacked. Dharmendra Pradhan is a criminal Education Minister. He must go.”

NDA accuses opposition of avoiding Parliament Debate

New Delhi, July 24 (GNS): National Democratic Alliance (NDA) leaders on Friday accused the Opposition of acting irresponsibly and avoiding a discussion on the examination paper leak issue, even as Parliament witnessed another day of disruptions during the Monsoon Session. Union Minister Rajiv Ranjan (Lalan) Singh alleged that the Opposition’s conduct was undermining democratic functioning and claimed that the protest movement had been amplified through social media accounts operating from Pakistan.

“The attitude of the opposition itself is irresponsible. If the opposition remains irresponsible, where will democracy be? You



have now seen that this entire movement — more than 480 social media handles are being operated from Pakistan,” Lalan Singh said. Union Minister Giriraj Singh accused Opposition leaders of attempting to derive political mileage from the issue and contrasted their approach with that of Prime Minister Narendra Modi. “Rahul Gandhi, Kejriwal, whether it is Akhilesh

Yadav, these are political celebrations — they think they got a good opportunity. The Prime Minister remained sensitive and stood with the children. More than 22 lakh children appeared for the exams, and now they are preparing for admission. He talked about a strict law and also spoke about fast-track courts. Modi ji is standing with the children, and the country is watching,” Giriraj Singh said.

Assam Flood: NDRF evacuates over 4,000 as rescue operations continue

Guwahati, July 24 (GNS): Rescue and evacuation operations continued across flood-hit parts of Assam on Friday, with the National Disaster Response Force (NDRF) intensifying flood water rescue (FWR) efforts amid heavy rainfall and rising river levels, officials said. According to official figures, NDRF teams have so far rescued 59 people, evacuated 4,037 residents to safer locations, rescued 48 livestock and recovered five bodies from flood-affected areas of the state. The rescue personnel have been deployed in vulnerable districts where inundation caused by swollen rivers has disrupted normal life, with teams carrying



out round-the-clock operations using boats and specialised rescue equipment. Meanwhile, Chief Minister Himanta Biswa Sarma said the rescue and evacuation drive was being carried out in close coordination among various agencies to ensure the safety of affected residents. “Rescue and evacuation operations continue in close coordination across affected areas. My compliments to NDRF personnel for their unwavering commitment,” CM Sarma said in a post on X. The Chief Minister also shared the latest operational figures of the NDRF, highlighting

the scale of the ongoing rescue mission in flood-ravaged districts. Officials said NDRF personnel remain on high alert and are being assisted by the State Disaster Response Force (SDRF), district administrations, police, fire and emergency services, and local volunteers. The coordinated effort is focused on rescuing stranded people, shifting vulnerable families to relief camps and ensuring the safety of livestock. Several low-lying areas continue to remain submerged following incessant rainfall and the steady rise in water levels of major rivers, affecting transportation and disrupting daily life in many districts.

Having recently overtaken Japan with a population of 125 million, India with a population size of 1.46 billion has captured the rank of 4th largest economy by the measure of Nominal GDP – or Gross Domestic Product calculated at current market prices. Further as per a report published by Morgan Stanely, India is set to become world's third largest economy by 2028 measured on the same scale and may see our gross domestic product (GDP) double to 10.6 trillion by 2035. But is nominal GDP a true reflection of a country's real economic strength?

The answer is not actually, as Nominal GDP represents the total monetary value of all goods and services produced in a country in a specific period without adjusting for inflation. It is widely used as a basic indicator of a country's economic size. While it is an important economic measure, nominal GDP alone is not a comprehensive indicator of a country's and countrymen's real strength. Let's explore why.

Global Economic Ranking: It reflects the total market value of a country's output and is used to rank economies (e.g., U.S. is No. 1, India is No. 4 in 2025). It is important for international influence, foreign investment, and membership in global forums (G20, IMF quotas, etc.).

Monetary Comparison: It compares absolute economic size in dollar terms and helps global investors, institutions, and policymakers allocate resources and assess market poten-

tial. Why Nominal GDP Is Not Enough Inflation Distorts Reality: Nominal GDP increases can be driven by inflation, not actual increase in production. If prices rise but output stays the same, nominal GDP will grow – giving a false impression of economic strength.

No Insight into Living Standards: High GDP does not mean high per capita income or quality of life. For example, India has a large nominal GDP but relatively low per capita income compared to smaller economies like Switzerland or Norway. Quantitatively we might have taken over Japan in absolute terms of nominal GDP but Human Development Index measured as a result of per capita GDP remains quite low in India.

Ignores Income Inequality: Nominal GDP says nothing about wealth distribution. A country may

be rich overall but still have large segments of its population living below poverty line. For example total GDP in Japan distributed among 12.5 crores gives them a high standard of living and sense of richness when compared with our GDP distributed among 146 crores. Doesn't Account for Purchasing Power: It doesn't reflect how far money goes within a country. That's why GDP at Purchasing Power Parity (PPP) is often a better measure for comparing living standards across countries.

Excludes Sustainability and Informal Economy: It doesn't measure environmental sustainability, health, or education quality. In developing economies like ours, a large part of economic activity remains informal and often underreported while mentioning nominal GDP.

Better Indicators of “Real Economic Strength”

Real GDP – Real GDP adjusts for inflation, using constant prices from a base year. Real GDP provides a more accurate measure of economic growth because it eliminates the impact of price changes.

GDP per Capita – It measures average income along with standard of living. GDP per capita means Gross Domestic Product (GDP) divided by the population of a country or region. It represents the average income or economic output per person, offering a way to gauge the economic prosperity of a nation while accounting for its population size.

PPP GDP – It reflects cost of living and real purchasing power which further determines how much happy the population is.

Human Development Index (HDI) – It combines GDP with health and education indicators determine their standards being

enjoyed by the population of the country. Gini Coefficient – It is a measure of statistical dispersion intended to represent the income inequality, the wealth inequality, or the consumption inequality within the country.

Global Competitiveness Index / Ease of Doing Business – It reflects economic potential and systemic efficiency. Hence nominal or gross GDP is useful, especially for comparing the size of economies in dollar terms and attracting investment. However, it is not a complete measure of real economic strength, as it overlooks inflation, purchasing power, income inequality, and quality of life.

To truly assess a country's economic strength, a multi-dimensional approach is needed – combining real GDP per capita income, PPP, and social indicators like education, health, and sustainability.

Indian Cities' Potential 'Change Growth Trajectory'

A recent report titled ‘Towards Resilient & Prosperous Cities’, prepared jointly by the World Bank with the Union Ministry of Housing and Urban Affairs and Global Facility for Disaster Reduction and Recovery (GFDRR), covering 24 cities, has estimated that by 2050, India's urban population would nearly double and reach 951 million and 70 percent of all employment would be generated in metros. While extreme heat has been projected in 25 large cities,the heat-treated fatalities are expected to double. In addition, surface floods are expected to rise between 75 and 100 percent in the above period.Without intervention, annual losses from stormwater or pluvial flooding are projected to rise from the current \$4 billion to \$5 billion by 2030 and could reach \$14–30 billion by 2070 due to ongoing urbanisation and climate impacts.

Not just this report, but Indian cities have been in the news for various reasons as high population density over the past few decades has posed an array of critical challenges. But India is not alone as most countries have been witnessing this dilemma. The growth of cities in India has been largely unplanned, leading to a myriad of problems and an urban mess that demands immediate attention. Though the cities face diverse problems, very little attempt has been made to tackle these challenges, mainly due to resource constraints faced by most state governments.

The lack of rural development has witnessed influx of people from the villages and semi-urban areas over decades in search of employment but most, if not all cities, do not have the infrastructure to cope with the increasing population growth. One of the most glaring consequences of unplanned urban growth is the strain it places on existing infrastructure. Basic amenities like potable water supply, sanitation and transportation struggle to keep up with the escalating demands of an ever-expanding population. The result is an overburdened infrastructure that fails to meet the needs of its residents, leading to increased congestion, inadequate services, and a diminished quality of life.

Unplanned urban growth has given rise to a significant increase in traffic congestion. With limited road networks and an unchecked surge in the number of vehicles, commuting has become a daily struggle in many cities. Traffic snarls not only waste valuable time but also contribute to increased fuel consumption, environmental pollution, and health hazards. The absence of comprehensive public transportation systems and proper planning further exacerbates the problem. But the most crucial aspect of the traffic problem is the rapid increase in accidents, specially in the metros and big cities, which occur almost daily.

It's worth noting that among metros, Kolkata has the highest vehicular density with over 2446 vehicles per kilometre of road. The city has around 46 lakh vehicles plying on 1850 km of road space while Delhi has substantially more vehicles (1.52 crore) and has around 34,000 km of toads, giving it a vehicular density of less than 400 per kilometre. As regards Kolkata, it can easily be said that over 40 percent of vehicles, most trucks do not follow environmental norms and, as such, emit black fumes. Thus, air pollution in all the metros and big cities has emerged as a severe problem in recent years, primarily due to large number of transport vehicles and even private buses emittingobnoxious fumes and polluting the environment. One can easily notice emissions from these vehicles which contribute to increased air pollution and environment and greatly affect those living in slums, squatter settlements and pavements. Greenhouse gas emissions are found to contribute up to 70 percent from the urban sector, though this occupies a negligible per cent of the earth's surface.

The other aspect of city life, at least in India, is frequent flooding, which even the World Bank report has pointed out. According to environmentalists, governments must conserve water bodies that are buffer zones. The loss of hundreds of lakes and ponds has contributed to the increase in urban flooding. Some of them have stated the urgent need of cleaning up water bodies, preserving open areas, creating sponge parks and re-viving stepwells to lower flooding. Cities are aware of the problem but due to financial constraints can do much in this regard.

Whether it is Delhi, Kolkata or Mumbai, quantum jump in residential cover, eating up farmland or vacant areas has hampered percolation of flood water. Down south Chennai is focusing on desilting and cleaning water bodies, stormwater drains and catch pits, while Delhi will soon have a drainage master plan, as per municipal officials. Urban flooding is a serious threat to public health in India. Large cities often experience spikes in dengue, typhoid, chikungunya, and leptospirosis, whenever water collects or is contaminated. Reports from CMC Vellore and other institutes indicate that India had 1 crore cases of typhoid fever in 2021, half of the world-wide total that year.

All the problems witnessed in cities are obviously due to the rapid influx of people into cities that has resulted in a severe shortage of housing facilities with large sections of the population residing in slums. While recognised slums are a little better, squatter settlements are in a pitiable condition as they do not have the necessities of life and majority of metros and big cities are plagued with this problem.

In such a situation, urban living has become a nightmare for most people. With the density of population increasing every year added to the high levels of pollution, the lack of potable drinking water for a significant section of the population, the increase in slums and squatter settlements, uncontrolled diseases with overcrowding of hospitals have all contributed to make city life not all that comfortable. There is little greenery in the metros and big cities, making life even more miserable for old people.

But thinking about the future and the huge population that would invade cities urban survival is imperative and this would depend on a massive infrastructural overhaul in terms of infrastructure and transportation. Huge investments are obviously called for but small steps like solar roof-top, systematic waste collection and management and low-carbon services are the need of the hour in the coming years to make cities liveable. The report warns: Indian cities will be unable to reach their full potential if they stayed on their current development trajectory. They are highly vulnerable to climate impacts because of the heavy concentration of people and assets and limited capacity to manage the impacts. The government must heed and read the writing on the wall.

Firm up action plan to tame flood fury

THE ongoing monsoon season has witnessed above-normal rainfall across the country, in line with the forecast of the India Meteorological Department. There has been heavy rainfall in many states, with hilly regions reporting rain-triggered disasters like landslides and flashfloods. The Himalayan belt — Himachal Pradesh, Uttarakhand, Jammu and Kashmir — has seen persistent, widespread and intense rainfall. One of the worst disasters of the season has occurred at Dharali in Uttarkashi district, where flashfloods supposedly caused by a cloudburst have led to the loss of lives and property. It is a grim reminder of the danger of unbridled development in the ecologically fragile region.

In the plains too, the monsoon is causing havoc, with major cities reporting flooding of roads, casualties and collapse of old structures. Social media is flooded with images of killer traffic jams due to waterlogging; cars and trucks going down in sink holes on city roads and highways; schoolchildren and office-goers stranded for long hours; and tragic incidents such as electrocution. Some newly built airport buildings have not withstood incessant rains. Affected cities like Bengaluru, Hyderabad, Chennai and Mumbai are hubs of significant economic activity and centres of outsourcing activities.

Brushing aside rain-related impacts as 'nature's fury'



would be fallacious. What Indian cities are experiencing during the monsoon is an accumulated and combined result of poor urban planning, neglect of basic infrastructure, violation of municipal regulations, erosion of green and open areas, large-scale concretisation, etc. On top of all this we have climate change — which itself is a man-made phenomenon. For decades, scientists have been warning of a rise in extreme rainfall events as a result of climate change.

An extreme weather event occurs when the amount of rain or snow experienced in one location substantially exceeds the normal quantum, as is happening in many of our cities. The average rainfall for a city or region may remain within the normal range, but some days or places get high rainfall in a short time, resulting in waterlogging and local flooding. The situation is only going to worsen as India is urbanising at a rapid pace. Nearly one billion Indians would

be living in cities by 2050, as per current projections. But Indian cities will be unable to reach their full potential if they stay on their current development trajectory, warns a recent report from the World Bank. Indian cities, according to the report, are highly vulnerable to climate impacts due to high human density and massive concentration assets. Cities are facing higher climate impacts and disasters compared to villages as they depend on highly interconnected systems. When key infrastructure like a highway or electricity grid breaks down, it can cause a chain reaction resulting in cascading infrastructure failure and paralysing the city. Flooding can cause road closure and disrupt traffic flow, affect electricity lines and lead to economic losses, as being seen currently. Going by the monsoon chaos every year, it is clear that our cities are ill-prepared for the twin challenges of further urbanisation and climate change. They have limited capacity

to manage these impacts. Their planning and management systems are unable to keep pace with rapid urbanisation, climate impacts and the demand for development and services.

The existing systems are outmoded — in many cases, they date back to the British and princely eras. For instance, the drainage and stormwater system for Hyderabad was designed a century ago by Sir M Visvesvaraya for a population of about five lakh. The system was considered modern at that time and accounted for future growth and concerns like aesthetics and urban planning. Hyderabad was considered a city of lakes and gardens with a well-connected natural drainage system. All this has got destroyed due to rapid expansion of physical infrastructure and high density of population. The result is flooding.

This is pretty much the story of every major Indian city. Many cities are along the coast or in the floodplains of major and minor rivers. Urbanisa-

tion increases impermeability, making areas with previously low flood risk prone to flooding. Cities are encroaching upon floodplains. Between 1985 and 2015, built-up or settlement area grew by 82 per cent in flood-safe areas and 102 per cent in high flood-risk areas, according to the World Bank report. Stormwater-related or pluvial (surface water) flooding risk is projected to rise manifold due to the combined effect of climate change and urbanisation.

The solution lies in preparing our cities to be climate-resilient. For this, we need city-specific climate action plans. At present, these efforts are fragmented. All states have generic state action plans, most of which are poorly implemented or just remain on paper. The challenges of urban areas are varied, requiring an integrated approach. Specific strategies need to be devised to address urban flooding, based on the local risk profile. Similar action plans are needed for hilly areas.

Cities need watershed-based flood protection plans to regulate floodplain development and stormwater management. Urban authorities must prioritise investments in drains and flood embankments, and in protection or creation of open spaces that can absorb flood water or sustainable urban drainage systems. Chennai has made a start in developing a city-specific Climate Action Plan based on risk assessment. Kolkata is working on a flood forecasting and early warning system.

India & UAE Commit to Deepening Defence Partnership at 13th Joint Defence Cooperation Committee Meeting

New Delhi, July 24 (GNS): India and the United Arab Emirates (UAE) reaffirmed their commitment to strengthening bilateral defence cooperation during the 13th India-UAE Joint Defence Cooperation Committee (JDCC) meeting, held at the Secretary level for the first time, in New Delhi on July 30, 2025. The meeting was co-chaired by Defence Secretary Shri Rajesh Kumar Singh and UAE's Under Secretary of Defense, Lt General Ibrahim Nasser M. Al Alawi, who is leading a high-level defence delegation on a two-day official visit to India. Both sides agreed to elevate defence ties to match the growing momentum in areas such as trade, investment, and people to people relations.

The two sides agreed to enhance military training cooperation and discussed their respective training requirements. India offered to provide customised training

courses tailored to the UAE's needs. They also agreed to cooperate on maritime security through sharing of information.

In a bid to explore new avenues of defence collaboration, both countries held discussions on training cooperation, defence industrial partnerships, and Service-to-Service engagements. They agreed to pursue joint manufacturing initiatives, including models similar to the collaboration between ICOMM (India) and CARACAL (UAE) for small arms production. The potential for co-developing next generation defence technologies in emerging areas such as Artificial Intelligence was also discussed, alongside opportunities in shipbuilding including refits and upgrades, and maintenance of common platforms. A Memorandum of Understanding was signed between the Indian Coast Guard and the UAE National Guard to establish

a framework for enhanced cooperation in search and rescue operations, pollution response, anti-piracy efforts, and related maritime security domains.

In the run-up to the JDCC, India and UAE also held the 4th Army-to-Army, 9th Navy-to-Navy, and inaugural Air-to-Air Staff Talks from July 28-29, 2025. These deliberations focused on enhancing military exercises, training, and Subject Matter Expert Exchange.

The UAE delegation is scheduled to call on the Raksha Rajya Mantri Shri Sanjay Seth on July 31, 2025, and will participate in the 2nd India-UAE Defence Industry Partnership Forum, co-inaugurated by the UAE Under Secretary and India's Secretary (Defence Production) Shri Sanjeev Kumar.

India and UAE share a robust and growing defence relationship, underpinned by the Comprehensive Strategic Partnership established dur-

ing the Prime Minister Shri Narendra Modi's landmark visit to the UAE in 2015. India's upcoming participation in the Dubai Air Show in November 2025 is set to further reinforce this momentum.

The meeting highlighted the shared commitment of India and the UAE towards maintaining peace, stability, and security in the Indian Ocean Region and the wider Gulf region. Both sides recognised the importance of closer coordination in addressing emerging security challenges, including maritime threats, transnational crimes, and evolving geopolitical dynamics.

The two countries also reviewed ongoing defence engagements and expressed satisfaction with the progress made through regular military exchanges, joint exercises, and institutional mechanisms. They emphasised the need to further strengthen interoperability between their armed forces

through increased operational cooperation and exchange of expertise.

India and the UAE have been steadily expanding their defence industrial cooperation, with both nations exploring opportunities for technology transfer, research and development, and investment partnerships. The discussions focused on encouraging greater participation of defence companies from both countries to build resilient supply chains and support innovation in the defence sector.

The successful conclusion of the JDCC meeting reaffirmed the strong strategic partnership between India and the UAE. Both sides expressed confidence that enhanced defence cooperation would further contribute to regional security while opening new avenues for collaboration in advanced military technologies, defence production, and capacity building.

Women Empowered to Start Businesses, Boost Incomes: Shivraj Singh Chouhan

New Delhi, July 24 (GNS): Union Minister for Agriculture, Farmers' Welfare and Rural Development, Shri Shivraj Singh Chouhan, today stated that loans worth over 11 lakh crore have been disbursed to women Self-Help Groups (SHGs) through formal financial institutions under the Deendayal Antyodaya Yojana – National Rural Livelihoods Mission (DAY-NRLM). Moreover, the Community Based Repayment Mechanism (CBRM) is being fortified to ensure timely loan recovery under this significant programme.

Shivraj Singh concluded by saying that central government initiatives like DAY-NRLM and 'Lakhpati Didi' are transforming the economic status of millions of women in rural India. This achievement is not merely a statistic but a symbol of collective.

Vietnam's VinFast kicks off operations at Electric Vehicle plant in Tamil Nadu

Chennai, July 24 (GNS): Vietnamese Electric Vehicle (EV) major VinFast on Monday officially inaugurated its assembly plant at Thoothukudi in Tamil Nadu, kicking off the move that will see a phased investment of up to Rs 16,000 crore. In its initial phase, the plant has a capacity to assemble 50,000 SUVs of its two premium electric SUV models the VF 6 and VF 7. The plant is scalable up to 150,000 units annually to meet the rising demand as the company aims to develop Thoothukudi as an export hub.

VinFast sees the plant, backed by Tamil Nadu's robust infrastructure, skilled labour, and port access, playing a key role as a car export hub for South Asia, the Middle East, and Africa.

"This project will seed an entirely new industrial cluster in southern Tamil Nadu," said state Industries Minister T.R.B. Raaja, noting its role in India's manufacturing ambitions.

VinFast recently also began work on a \$200 million assembly plant in Indonesia and is expanding into Thailand and the Philippines as well. VinFast sold nearly 97,000 vehicles in 2024, which was three times its previous year's total, catering mainly to the domestic market in Vietnam.

VinFast opened its first showroom in India at Gujarat's Surat on July 27 as the company looks to tap the growing market for electric cars in the country. The showroom will showcase the company's electric SUV variants VF 6 and VF 7 which will be launched as right-hand drive variants for the first time. The company plans to open 35 dealerships across 27 cities in the country by the year-end. The company is entering India's fast-growing EV market, which remains largely dominated by home-grown Tata Motors and Mahindra and Hyundai and MG Motor

in the premium category.

While India sold over six million EVs in 2024, four-wheel passenger vehicles made up only 2.5 per cent of that total. The Vietnamese EV maker has formed partnerships with RoadGrid, myTVS, and Global Assure to provide charging and after-sales services across India. The company has also joined hands with BatX Energies to promote battery recycling and establish a circular battery value chain, reinforcing its commitment to sustainable innovation.

Earlier this month Elon Musk-run Tesla launched its Model Y in India with price starting at Rs 59.89 lakh with its first showroom in Mumbai. Tesla, will be importing the Model Y as a completely built unit (CBU), from its manufacturing facility at Shanghai in China.

The inauguration of VinFast's Tamil Nadu facility marks a significant milestone in India's efforts

to attract global electric vehicle manufacturers and strengthen its position as a major automobile production destination. The project is expected to generate employment opportunities, boost local manufacturing capabilities, and encourage the development of supporting industries in the region.

The company aims to leverage India's growing EV ecosystem by increasing localisation of components and collaborating with domestic suppliers. VinFast's investment is also expected to contribute to Tamil Nadu's existing automobile manufacturing base, which includes a wide network of vehicle manufacturers, component makers, and technology providers.

With India targeting faster adoption of electric mobility, global automakers are increasingly looking at the country as both a consumer market and a manufacturing hub.

Hails National AI Mission, Celebrates Women-Led Startups as Pillars of New India

New Delhi, July 24 (GNS): Union Minister of State (Independent Charge) for Science & Technology, Dr. Jitendra Singh, today delivered an inspiring keynote address at "The Week" magazine's "Education Conclave", calling upon the students to be good "learners" to harness the power of rapidly evolving.

The Minister urged the nation's youth to rise to the demands of a rapidly changing technology landscape. He urged students to keep pace with emerging tools like Artificial Intelligence (AI), while emphasizing the equal importance of Human Intelligence (HI) —creativity, emotional insight, and ethical reasoning. "Technology is evolving faster than ever before, but it must not override our human values. An optimal combination of AI and HI will define the next wave of innovation," Dr. Jitendra Singh stated.

The Minister hailed India's National AI Mission, noting that India is now on an equal pedestal with other leading

nations in AI technology development. He cautioned, however, against over-dependence on machines and advocated for a hybrid model of learning and governance that balances algorithmic efficiency with human empathy.

Dr. Jitendra Singh highlighted India's growing role in global scientific collaborations, particularly in space exploration, climate tech, and biotechnology. He stated that Indian scientists and startups are now active partners in international missions and innovation challenges, thanks to initiatives such as BIRAC (Biotechnology Industry Research Assistance Council) and IN-SPaCe (Indian National Space Promotion and Authorization Center), which facilitate student and private-sector participation. "Today, we don't just witness rocket launches—we bring 15,000 to 20,000 students to witness them live. We are building scientific temperament at scale," he emphasized. To make scientific research a preferred

career path, Dr. Jitendra Singh underlined the government's efforts through the Anusandhan National Research Foundation (NRF), expanded fellowships, and structured mentorship programs. He pointed to an ongoing shift away from traditional career tracks like engineering and medicine, with students increasingly drawn toward biotech, clean energy, quantum computing, and robotics.

"Research is no longer the preserve of PhDs—it starts in school. Our mentorship programs help teachers identify and nurture potential early," he said. Marking the near completion of five years of the National Education Policy (NEP) 2020, Dr. Jitendra Singh celebrated the policy's transformative impact on subject choice, aptitude-based learning, and interdisciplinary education. He noted that NEP has created space for students to discover and realign their strengths, especially post-Class 10, allowing a shift from rigid tracks to purpose-

driven learning.

Highlighting the critical role of women in India's startup ecosystem, Dr. Jitendra Singh described women-led development as one of the defining pillars of Viksit Bharat. "Women are no longer just participating—they are leading, and that leadership is reshaping India's innovation story," he remarked. Responding to student concerns about access and equity, Dr. Jitendra Singh emphasized the government's focus on bridging the digital and scientific divide. Through rural outreach programs, digital access models, and schemes targeted at marginalized communities, the government is ensuring that geography no longer limits ambition.

He recounted the story of a young girl from a terror-affected district in Kashmir who cracked the civil services exam by self-studying for 14 hours a day using only digital tools—a testament to the power of accessible.

Net direct tax collection surges after reduction of corporate tax rates: Minister

New Delhi, July 24 (GNS): The net direct tax collection saw strong growth in FY25 at Rs 22,26,375 crore, a 13.48 per cent year-on-year growth, as there has been an overall increase in collections after reduction of the corporate tax rates with effect from Assessment year (AY) 2020-21, the Parliament was informed.

Since FY 2021-22, the growth in net direct tax collection has been robust, Minister of State for Finance, Pankaj Chaudhary, told the Lok Sabha in a written reply. The total revenue impact on account of tax benefits extended to companies was Rs 88,109.27 crore and Rs 98,999.57 crore (projected) in FY 2022-23 and FY 2023-24, respectively.

"The above tax benefits have the impact of making the corporates competitive and encouraging investment and, therefore, economic growth," the

minister said. To encourage startups, initiatives taken have resulted in an increase in the number of startups claiming deduction under Section 80IAC of the Income Tax Act from 328 in AY 2022-23 to 877 in AY 2024-25.

Further, the number of companies covered under Section 80JJAA in respect of employment of new employees has increased from 2,838 in AY 2022-23 to 3,644 in AY 2024-25, said Chaudhary. "The specific incentives are provided in the Income-tax Act through the Finance Bill. The initiatives taken have led to the generation of employment, an increase in tax revenue and overall economic growth," he noted. In order to create a globally competitive business environment for domestic companies, attract fresh investment and create employment opportunities, section 115BAA and section

115BAB were introduced in the Income Tax Act through the Taxation Laws (Amendment) Act, 2019.

The impact of Section 115BAB is reflected in a significant growth of new manufacturing companies from 2,928 in AY 2022-23 to 7,185 in AY 2024-25, according to the minister.

India's total gross direct tax collections (before adjusting for refunds) have more than doubled in the last five years, reflecting the high economic growth and improved tax compliance in the country, which has been encouraged with the introduction of the new digital technology.

The government highlighted that the rise in direct tax collections reflects improved compliance, widening of the taxpayer base, and increased use of technology-driven systems in tax administration. Digital initiatives such as online filing, data analytics.

Centre implements reforms to boost business & investments

New Delhi, July 24 (GNS): The government has consistently undertaken wide-ranging reforms to improve the business environment, attract investments, and promote economic growth, the Parliament was informed on Monday, as the country is projected to clock GDP growth in the range of 6.3 per cent to 6.8 per cent in the current fiscal (FY26).

These measures include initiatives undertaken under the Ease of Doing Business programme, comprising the Business Reform Action Plan (BRAP), Business-Ready assessment, Jan Vishwas, and Reducing Compliance Burden on Businesses and Citizens, said Minister of State for Finance, Pankaj Chaudhary, in a written reply to a question in the Lok Sabha.

As per the latest available Provisional Estimates of Gross Domestic Product (GDP) released by the Min-

istry of Statistics and Programme Implementation, GDP at constant prices is estimated to have grown by 6.5 per cent in 2024-25.

This growth was primarily driven by robust performance in the construction sector (9.4 per cent), public administration, defence and other services (8.9 per cent) and financial, real estate, and professional services (7.2 per cent).

Looking ahead, the Economic Survey 2024-25 has projected GDP growth for the year 2025-26 in the range of 6.3 per cent to 6.8 per cent. The government has undertaken a series of initiatives to attract greater domestic and foreign investment, focusing on robust capital expenditure, infrastructure development, financial sector reforms, and enhancing the ease of doing business.

The Union Budget 2025-26 identifies investment as one of the four key engines

of growth. Complementary measures include credit guarantee schemes, the Production-Linked Incentive (PLI) Scheme, and the creation of a strong skilling ecosystem.

The government stated that continuous reforms in regulations, digital infrastructure, and administrative processes have helped improve investor confidence and strengthen India's position as a preferred investment destination. Measures aimed at reducing compliance requirements have eased the burden on businesses and encouraged entrepreneurship. The focus on infrastructure development and capital expenditure has remained central to the government's growth strategy. Investments in roads, railways, ports, logistics, and digital connectivity are expected to improve productivity and create new opportunities.

IRDAI slaps Rs 5 cr penalty on Policybazaar for various violations

New Delhi, July 24 (GNS): Insurance sector regulator IRDAI has slapped a Rs 5 crore penalty on online insurance platform Policybazaar over violating several charges under various provisions of the Insurance Act and IRDAI (Insurance Web Aggregators) Regulations, 2017. The penalty amount should be remitted by the insurance web aggregator (IWA) within a period of 45 days from the date of receipt of this order, according to an IRDAI order. The order stated that key managerial personnel (KMPs) and employees of the web aggregator are allegedly having directorships in other companies without prior IRDAI approval. "In addition, it is also observed that the President, Head of Operations, Director General Insurance Business, and BU Head were holding the position of the directorship in other entities," the order read.

Apart from regulatory

breaches, Policybazaar has been found guilty of allegedly promoting products in a biased manner, and ranking various insurance products are top or best without "making available any material to the prospects to make an informed choice".

"IWA apologised for not taking the prior approval of the Authority. Post Personal Hearing, the IWA submitted that current Principal Officer and Key Managerial Personnel (KMPs) are not holding directorship in any other company," it further added. The IWA regulations require that the domain names of primary or secondary, or product category-specific websites are owned and registered in the name of the IWA. "However, it is noticed that the website of policybazaar.com is owned by its holding company. IWA has paid a license fee @ 5 per cent of the revenue to the holding company for the usage of the domain name.

Telangana CM orders setting up of bureau for traffic management, road safety

Hyderabad, July 24 (GNS) Telangana Chief Minister A. Revanth Reddy on Friday directed officials to establish a dedicated bureau for traffic management and road safety in the state. He stated that a comprehensive study of the transportation system should be conducted, and the bureau for traffic management and road safety should have an institutional structure. The Chief Minister reviewed traffic management and road safety in Telangana with senior officials.

According to the Chief Minister's Office (CMO), he instructed officials to conduct reviews every 2 or 3 months on the measures to be taken for traffic stream-

lining. He told officials that merely enforcing regulations is not the solution to traffic issues; instead, greater emphasis should be placed on traffic management and streamlining. They were asked to devise traffic management plans that take into account weather conditions, work schedules, and peak traffic hours. It was emphasised that necessary studies regarding traffic management should be conducted before creating new infrastructure. The Chief Minister noted that a significant number of accidents occur due to vehicles stopping on the Outer Ring Road (ORR), citing recent accidents as examples. He directed officials



to implement preventive measures and ensure continuous monitoring to stop vehicles from parking haphazardly on the ORR. He observed that traffic congestion is worsening in the core urban region because motorists frequently have to stop at closely spaced traffic signals. He called for the construction of under-

passes and elevated corridors wherever necessary to create a signal-free traffic system in the city. He advised ensuring continuous vehicle movement at signals to prevent traffic stagnation as much as possible and ordered officials to study the implementation of a smart signalling system.

At another review meeting, Chief Minister Revanth Reddy instructed officials to take strict action for drug control in the state. Stating that the government is taking the issue of drug control seriously, he called for implementation of stringent regulations to crack down on the drug menace.

The Chief Minister directed that educational institutions be held accountable for drug control, suggesting that declarations be obtained from students and that management be made responsible. He suggested that prin-

cipals of respective schools and colleges be held liable for drug-related issues in government educational institutions. He asked officials to consider framing rules that would make the management responsible for any drug-related incident occurring within the campus.

The Chief Minister also instructed officials to establish a system to identify and report drug-related activities taking place outside the campuses. He ordered measures to ensure that management set up special units to monitor and detect changes in student behaviour.

The CM suggested exploring the installation of toll-free numbers and dedicated

QR codes within educational premises to facilitate the reporting of drug-related information. He outlined a three-stage approach for drug prevention in educational institutions: first, identifying drug users and helping them overcome their addiction; and second, punishing those who supply drugs.

Officials were instructed to send individuals caught using drugs for the first time to de-addiction centres and to consider imposing severe penalties on those caught repeatedly.

The Chief Minister also directed officials to examine the possibility of enacting new legislation to deal strictly with the drugs menace.

Dy CM Bhatti calls for Singareni's diversification into critical minerals, assures full Govt backing

Hyderabad, July 24 (GNS) Telangana Deputy Chief Minister Bhatti Vikramarka on Friday assured full government support for the expansion and modernisation of Singareni Collieries Company Limited (SCCL), urging the coal major to diversify beyond coal mining into critical and rare earth minerals to remain competitive in the evolving global energy sector.

Chairing a review meeting with senior Singareni and GENCO officials at Kothagudem, Bhatti said the growing adoption of solar, wind, pumped storage, hydrogen and battery energy storage technologies over



the next 15-20 years would gradually reduce dependence on coal.

He suggested that Singareni explore mining of lithium, cobalt and other critical minerals and participate in mineral block auctions in countries such as Australia and South Africa.

Describing the 130-year-old Singareni as the "soul of Telangana," he said the public sector company must improve efficiency, reduce operational costs, maintain high coal quality and strengthen coal washeries to compete effectively with private players in the

future of thousands of employees' families.

Bhatti also criticised the previous BRS government for allegedly failing to secure new coal blocks and neglecting long-term planning for thermal power projects. He said the Congress government had expedited land acquisition and forest clearances for the Naini Block in Odisha and the Tadicherla-II project. He further instructed that future Board meetings should focus on the company's expansion strategy and on preparing a comprehensive 10-year roadmap with clear implementation timelines.

TG Horticulture Dept to conduct urban farming training on July 26

Hyderabad, July 24 (GNS) The Telangana Department of Horticulture will organise a one-day training programme on urban farming at the Telangana Horticulture Training Institute (THTI), Red Hills, here on July 26 under the "Mana Illu Mana Kurugayalu" programme.

The programme will be held from 10.00 am to 1.00 pm and aims to create awareness on terrace cultivation of quality, pesticide-residue-free vegetables to promote public health and reduce carbon emissions, according to an official notification re-

leased here on Friday.

The department said the initiative assumes significance in view of rapid urbanisation, shrinking space for cultivation and the rising vegetable prices.

It noted that, as per the Indian Council of Medical Research (ICMR), an adult should consume around 400 grams of vegetables daily for a balanced diet.

Mahesh Kumar Goud slams KTR

Hyderabad, July 24 (GNS) Telangana Pradesh Congress Committee (TPCC) President and MLC Mahesh Kumar Goud today accused the BRS of indulging in political drama over student issues, alleging that the party had no moral right to protest after its record in government.

Speaking to the media at Gandhi Bhavan, Goud extended birthday wishes to BRS Working President K T Rama Rao (KTR) but questioned his decision to stage protests, recalling that it was the BRS government that had abolished the Dharna Chowk in Hyderabad. He said KTR should first apologise publicly for

denying democratic protest space before participating in agitations. Targeting former Chief Minister K Chandrasekhar Rao (KCR), Goud said Congress president Mallikarjun Kharge, despite his age, was fighting for students, while KCR had remained confined to his farmhouse. He also questioned why KCR had not joined the protests in Delhi.

The TPCC chief alleged that the BRS government had witnessed several examination paper leaks, including irregularities in Group-I recruitment, and accused it of failing to act against the Globarena company after the deaths of Intermediate students. He questioned

why the Globarena report was never made public and claimed there were suspicions over KTR's links with the company. Goud alleged that the BRS had failed to issue recruitment notifications during its tenure and said the party was trying to exploit the NEET paper leak for political gains. He claimed Congress leader Rahul Gandhi was genuinely fighting for justice for students by demanding the resignation of union Education Minister Dharmendra Pradhan. He also alleged that the BRS had amassed huge financial resources and suggested that assistance be provided to the families of students who lost their lives.

Taxpayers are partners in nation-building: Governor Shiv Pratap Shukla



Hyderabad, July 24 (GNS) Telangana Governor Shiv Pratap Shukla on Friday said taxpayers are the backbone of India's development and described tax payment as a significant contribution towards nation-building rather than merely a legal obligation.

Addressing the 167th Income Tax Day celebrations as the chief guest here, the Governor said honest taxpayers were the "silent architects" of India's progress and highlighted the role of taxation in supporting infrastructure development, national security and welfare programmes.

The programme was attended by Principal Chief Commissioner of Income Tax, Andhra Pradesh and Telangana, Suresh Battini; former CBDT Chairman K.V. Chowdary; senior Income Tax officials, employees, representatives of taxpayers' associations and Chartered Accountants.

Centre govt betrayed aspirations of students, unemployed youth: KTR

Hyderabad, July 24 (GNS) Bharat Rashtra Samithi (BRS) working president K.T. Rama Rao on Friday accused the Modi government of betraying the aspirations of millions of students and unemployed youth while refusing to take responsibility for repeated examination irregularities. He said the country was witnessing a dangerous trend in which those demanding accountability were being targeted instead of those responsible for failures.

KTR was addressing a massive gathering of students and youth at Indira Park in Hyderabad to express solidarity with students protesting in New Delhi.

He demanded the resig-

nation of Union Education Minister Dharmendra Pradhan, holding him morally accountable for repeated examination irregularities and the Centre's failure to safeguard students' interests. He urged the Union Government to engage in meaningful dialogue with the agitating students instead of resorting to repression and intimidation.

KTR said the overwhelming participation reflected growing anger against the Centre's handling of issues affecting young people, particularly the NEET paper leak and the alleged crack-down on student protests.

He asserted that the youth's voice cannot be silenced through force or in-

timidation and that every attempt to suppress democratic dissent would only strengthen the movement.

Calling upon the youth to remain united and democratic in their struggle, KTR said the fight was not merely against paper leaks or repression, but for justice, accountability and the future of India's youth. The BRS leader asked Prime Minister Narendra Modi not to underestimate Gen Z and youth, saying the voice of India is changing and a new generation of ideas is reshaping the nation's politics.

Citing the examples of Nepal and Sri Lanka, KTR remarked that when youth unite, they can bring down governments. He predicted

that this generation, unafraid of death, will rise and challenge the government.

He alleged that while the Centre was suppressing the voices of students and youth, Telangana Chief Minister Revanth Reddy was helping divert public attention from the Centre's failures. KTR said instead of leading a united fight against the Centre on an issue affecting students across the country, the Telangana Chief Minister had chosen to target the BRS for political gains. He accused Revanth Reddy of double standards, of avoiding confrontation with the Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) while attempting to divert attention by attacking the opposition.

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
