

Champat out, Ram Temple Trust names interim gen secy; CEO soon

New Delhi, July 6 (GNS)The first administrative action in the ongoing Ram Mandir donation theft row took place on Monday, with Shri Ram Janmabhoomi Teerth Kshetra Trust accepting the resignations of top functionaries Champat Rai and Anil Mishra. Both oversaw the temple's affairs, including the management of donations and finances.

Trust general secretary Rai and member Mishra had tendered their resignations on moral grounds after a special investigation team (SIT) probing the allegations of theft of the temple's offerings arrested eight persons, among them Rai's former driver. After a three-and-a-half-hour meeting in Ayodhya, the Trust named its member Krishna Mohan as interim general secretary and said a final appointment would be made on July 22, the day the next Trust meeting is scheduled. The



Trust also announced the formation of a three-member committee to appoint a chief executive officer (CEO) for the temple. The committee comprises retired judge Pramod Kohli, Lt Gen Vishnukant Chaturvedi (ret'd) and Suresh Havde.

Importantly, in a detailed statement issued after the meeting, the Trust said it had sought public comments on ways to improve the temple's functioning and would consider similar sug-

gestions from the SIT. The SIT report is expected to be available by July 22.

Maintaining that there had been no decline in the number of devotees visiting the temple despite "false narratives" and controversies, the Trust attacked sections of politicians for "exploiting the unfortunate incident to spread baseless allegations to mislead people rather than finding the truth". "Some people are trying to exploit this unfortunate in-

cident to undermine the collective Hindu faith, Hindu society, Ram Janmabhoomi and the deity himself.... But there is no fall in the number of devotees visiting Ram Mandir. This shows that despite the baseless allegations, the faith of Lord Rama devotees stays intact," said the Trust. After the meeting, the Trust described the theft of temple offerings as deeply "hurtful and concerning, and said all guilty should be punished". The Trust, however,

added that "until the legal process concluded and the truth was revealed, public allegations against individuals were unfair".

Speaking to the media later, Trust treasurer Govind Giri said the Trust "unanimously appreciated Rai's contributions to the Ram Temple movement and construction despite accepting his resignation". "Champat Rai, in my eyes, is untainted," he said, adding that Rai had devoted his entire life to the Ram Temple movement.

Giri also explained that the Trust rules provided for automatic acceptance of resignation should a member choose to step down. "Champat Rai resigned voluntarily. The Trust has no discretion in these matters," Giri said, citing the Trust's constitution that says resignations, if offered, must be accepted. "Rai can, however, choose to stay Trustee if he wants," he said.

TMC submits reply to EC, says rival faction making false claims

Kolkata, July 6 (GNS): The Trinamool Congress (TMC) delegation led by senior leader Kalyan Banerjee on Monday submitted its response to the Election Commission (EC) here. The party asserted that that its existing leadership remains constitutionally valid till 2027 and accused the rival faction of misreading its constitution and making a false claim.

The development comes after the EC last week issued notices to the rival factions led by Mamata Banerjee and Ritabrata Banerjee. The poll panel issued the notice following Ritabrata's petition seeking recognition as the 'real' Trinamool Congress. The EC directed both sides to submit detailed replies by 5.30 pm on July 6.

Speaking to reporters after submitting the party's response at the Election Commission's office, Kalyan Banerjee accompanied by Mahua Moitra and Sagarika Ghosh said the party had filed a comprehensive reply addressing every allegation raised by the rival faction.

"Today, we have filed our response which was sought by the EC on the basis of a representation made by Ritabrata Baner-



jee, the alleged secretary of the alleged TMC. We have given a very detailed reply on that," Kalyan said.

He said the rival faction's primary contention was that the tenure of the AITC committee and the National Working Committee was limited to three years and had consequently expired in 2025, rendering the current leadership invalid. Rejecting the claim, Kalyan said when the West Bengal Trinamool Congress was first registered as a political party in 1998, the tenure of the Working Committee and the AITC committee was indeed three years.

However, he said that after the party was converted into the All India Trinamool Congress (AITC) in 2000 and the amended constitution was approved

by the EC, the tenure was extended to four years. A subsequent constitutional amendment in 2006 further increased the tenure to five years, a change that was formally communicated to the EC.

He argued that the Commission has since recognised the five-year tenure and has consistently directed the party to conduct its organisational elections within that period.

"The last election was held in 2022. Therefore, automatically the life of the AITC and the National Working Committee remains for a period of five years. It will expire in 2027. Therefore, the first allegation that the life is no longer there is incorrect and not supported by the constitutional provisions of the AITC," he said.

Ram temple probe given to SIT, not central agencies due to BJP 'Rift', claims Akhilesh

Lucknow, July 6 (UNI): Samajwadi Party (SP) chief Akhilesh Yadav on Monday launched a veiled attack on the Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP), alleging that the investigation into the alleged Ram Temple donation theft case was entrusted to a Special Investigation Team (SIT) instead of central agencies such as the Central Bureau of Investigation (CBI) due to an "internal power struggle" within the party.

Addressing a press conference here, Akhilesh Yadav, without naming the BJP, suggested that it had two centres of power — one in Lucknow and the other in Delhi — and alleged that the handling of the investigation was influenced by this internal rivalry. "Offerings, donations, and contributions have fallen into the hands of a gang of thieves. They are unable to face



the public's anger. As you mentioned, they are afraid of public outrage, which is why they are staying indoors," he said.

"You mentioned the ED, CBI, and Income Tax. You did not understand what I said. I said this is a power struggle. This gang of thieves, who thrive on offerings and donations, is unable to face the public's outrage. They are terrified of this backlash, which is why they are staying holed up at home," he said, addressing

the reporters. Elaborating on his allegation, Akhilesh Yadav questioned why the matter was not investigated by central agencies.

"You haven't quite grasped the point regarding the ED, CBI, and Income Tax departments. I was talking about a power struggle. If the ED, CBI, or Income Tax were involved, who would be controlling the investigation? Before the Delhi leadership could even react, the Lucknow faction seized control of everything. Can't you understand even that much? What is this SIT? To whom was the report submitted? You fail to grasp even this simple fact," he said. The former Uttar Pradesh Chief Minister further alleged that the choice of the investigating agency itself reflected the internal political dynamics within the ruling party.

Prashant Kishor: aim is change, not just power in Bihar

Patna, July 6 (UNI): Jan Suraj Party founder and Bankipur bypoll candidate Prashant Kishor on Monday said that the objective of his party has never been merely to win elections or secure positions as MLAs or MPs, but to bring about meaningful political change in Bihar. Speaking to IANS, Kishor stressed that the Jan Suraj was founded with the vision of transforming the state's political landscape by encouraging voters to rise above caste, religion, party affiliations, and personality-driven politics.

"Personally, and as part of the Jan Suraj vision, our objective was never just to become MLAs or MPs. Our sole aim in entering politics is to bring change in Bihar. That change will happen only

when people rise above caste, religion, party loyalties, and blind devotion to leaders, and elect the right candidates," he said. Reflecting on the party's electoral performance, Kishor acknowledged that despite campaigning across Bihar for the past three years, Jan Suraj has not yet received the level of public support required to achieve electoral success. "I have been trying for the last three years, but people have still not voted for us in sufficient numbers. As a result, we suffered a major defeat. If people genuinely want change, they must vote for an alternative. Only then can a new political system emerge," he said.

Kishor maintained that electoral setbacks would not discourage him from pursuing his mission.

"A steadfast champion of national unity and integrity, he made the supreme sacrifice in Jammu & Kashmir while striving for its full integration with Bharat. Sanjay Raut blasts Shinde-Fadnavis govt over 'Missing Link' collapse and 'corrupt' governance

Mumbai, July 6 (UNI) Shiv Sena (UBT) leader and Member of Parliament Sanjay Raut has launched a scathing attack on the Devendra Fadnavis government, alleging deep-seated corruption and administrative negligence in the state's ongoing infrastructure projects and crisis management.

Mr Raut targeted the state leadership over the recent landslide at the Mumbai-Pune 'Missing Link' project site. Dismissing the government's official assessment that the damage was limited to a few potholes, Mr Raut asserted, "The Chief Minister should visit the



site himself. It is not just about potholes; the entire infrastructure project has collapsed." He alleged that the disaster is a direct outcome of a "30-35 per cent commission" culture, where kickbacks are reportedly funnelled into party coffers. "What is being touted as development is merely a facade

for broking and criminal negligence," the Rajya Sabha MP stated. Further criticising the state government's handling of recent urban crises, Mr Raut described the current administration as "Duryodhana's rule," marked by arrogance and a disconnect from the common man's suffering. He ex-

pressed deep anguish over the recent tragedy in Mankhurd, where several lives were lost, accusing ruling party representatives of prioritising photo opportunities and social engagements over public mourning.

The senior leader also escalated his rhetoric regarding the alleged misappropriation of donations at the Ram Mandir in Ayodhya.

He compared the current situation to historical lootings by invaders, alleging that those who projected themselves as "protectors" of the temple are now orchestrating its financial exploitation.

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G7 is no more than a relic of the past. India should focus more on G20, BRICS

Canada, which took over the G7 presidency from Japan in December 2024, has finally invited India to the upcoming G7 summit, evidently belated wisdom. Prime Minister Narendra Modi announced the invitation on X Friday evening, following a communication from his Canadian counterpart, Mark Carney. The two leaders are expected to meet on the sidelines of the G7 summit in Kananaskis later this month. This is not the first flip-flop, as the former Prime Minister Justin Trudeau, after accusing New Delhi of alleged hand in assassinations in Canada, admitted that “No evidentiary proof” was given to India. His flip-flop on the Hamas-Israel conflict is no secret. At a time when the world’s economic center of gravity is shifting towards Asia, and India has demonstrated leadership on multiple global platforms — including its recent G20 presidency — the delayed invitation suggests that Canada is unbothered by the detractors who continue to portray bilateral ties as “deteriorating,” though, without offering a clear explanation to silence the critics. As a mature statesman and a suave diplomat, PM Modi has accepted the invitation.

Canada seems to be missing a golden opportunity to reset bilateral ties and begin a new



chapter of peace and development. This flip-flop is somewhat unfortunate and does not bode well for the G7’s own ambitions — whether it is addressing climate change and global inequality or fostering cooperation with emerging economies, agendas it has pursued over the past three decades. It’s worth remembering how the G7 began. A ‘fireside chat’-turned-‘Library Group’ started by US treasury secretary George Shultz in 1970 to address currency turbulence bloomed into G6 five years later. On 15 November 1975, about five months after Indira Gandhi had imposed Emergency in India, leaders of six democracies — the US, UK, France, Germany, Italy, and Japan — met at the Castle of Rambouillet near

Paris. Today, none of the leaders from the “Summit of the Six” — James Callaghan (UK foreign secretary), Henry Kissinger (US secretary of state), Gerald Ford (US president), Takeo Miki (Japan prime minister), Helmut Schmidt (German chancellor), Jean Sauvagnargues (French foreign minister), Valéry Giscard d’Estaing (French president), and Mariano Rumor (Italian foreign minister) — are alive, and most of the countries no longer dominate the global economy. The G6 became the G7 in 1976 with Canada’s inclusion, and the G8 between 1997 and 2013 with Russia onboard— until Russia’s suspension after the Crimea annexation in 2014.

Collectively, the group expressed concern about

their respective economies, donned the mantle of the “white man’s burden” to discharge their responsibilities toward the ‘Third World’, and decided to meet again. Fifty years later, none of the world’s problems have been solved by these countries, and except for the US, the rest are no better off than the countries of the “poor South.” Over the years, G7 summits have taken on a broad agenda: gender equality, global health, climate change, and sustainable development. In 2021, the UK-led summit committed itself to a “green revolution” and net-zero carbon emissions by 2050. Germany’s 2022 presidency established a “Climate Club” to implement the Paris Agreement, and the 2023 Hiroshima summit

reaffirmed commitment to phasing out fossil fuels. India participated in all these meetings, contributing immensely to the resolution and their implementation. Ironically, it was Donald Trump-led “G1 within G7” that derailed consensus, dismissing global warming as a “hoax.” Now, with Trump 2.0 back in the mix and India 3.0 out, can the G7’s green agenda survive?

The G7’s agenda of connecting with emerging economies and adopting an inclusive approach has often rung hollow. Italy included an “African Segment” in the 2001 summit, but without serious financial commitments and steps to resolve issues of poverty and migration. African leaders left disappointed, questioning the G7’s sincerity.

Telangana govt must do more than blame BRS. Junking Kaleshwaram project shows incompetence

One of the core issues that led to the formation of Telangana in 2014 was water scarcity. So, it was not surprising when former chief minister and Bharat Rashtira Samithi supremo K Chandrashekar Rao announced the commencement of the Kaleshwaram Lift Irrigation Project in 2015. Originally called the ‘Dr BR Ambedkar Pranahita Chevella Sujala Sravanthi Project’ and announced by the Andhra Pradesh government in 2012 before the state’s bifurcation, the scheme was pegged at Rs 38,000 crore. By the time KCR inaugurated it in 2019, having renamed it ‘Kaleshwaram Lift Irrigation Project’, it had doubled in cost to Rs 80,190 crore. Of course, the area it would irrigate in Telangana had also expanded. And today, the cost has gone up to Rs 1.2 lakh crore.

For the BRS, the Kaleshwaram project is its crown jewel. It has been designed to bring drinking water and irrigation to Telangana’s parched regions.

The project aims to distribute about 240 thousand million cubic feet (TMC) of water, of which 190 TMC will be lifted from the Godavari river basin. It also involves building reservoirs at various places, and is expected to irrigate 18.8 lakh acres of land with 165 TMC of water. It will also provide 40 TMC of drinking water (30 to Hyderabad and 10 to the Mission Bhagiratha



drinking water project) and supply another 16 TMC for industrial purposes.

However, after the Congress came to power in Telangana following the 2023 Assembly elections, the project has become an albatross around KCR’s neck. The former CM is facing a judicial inquiry into alleged irregularities in the project. One of the major reasons behind this is the collapse of the Medigadda barrage under the lift irrigation project in the run-up to the 2023 elections. The Congress, then in the opposition, had promised to punish the BRS and probe into the matter. And incumbent CM Revanth Reddy has certainly kept his word. In fact, a vigilance report has indicted officials and called for action against them.

Corruption or irregularities are not a new thing for Telangana or India. But as things stand, the Kaleshwaram project’s future under the Congress government looks bleak. Irrigation minister N Uttam Kumar

Reddy said that the project has “collapsed”, blaming the BRS for it. He added that if the original plan for Rs 38,000 crore (with the project originating at Tummidihatti village and not Kaleshwaram) was followed, then the cost would not have gone up to an alleged Rs 1.2 lakh crore now.

While it is common for ruling parties to probe into the irregularities of previous governments, Uttam Kumar’s declaration of the collapse of the Kaleshwaram project is rather surprising. If the current government is bent on rectifying past mistakes, why not fix the project? Uttam Kumar claims that the Rs 62,000 crore that was added to the original cost could have been used for other projects. But public projects are never made for profit. The cost burden is usually offset by benefits that accumulate gradually over the years. In the case of the Kaleshwaram project, it is supposed to benefit lakhs of farmers in Telan-

gana who were promised more water once the state was formed. If the project is shelved after investing all this money, then what was the last decade spent on it for? Nothing? However, current employees and former officials of the irrigation department gave a different explanation for why the project was shelved. According to a senior irrigation department official, the irrigation barrage for the Pranahita Chevella project has been built, just not at the level at which it was originally planned.

“Due to various issues at Tummidihatti [the original focal point under the Pranahita Chevella project], the barrage was shifted to Kaleshwaram. The other reason for expanding the project and shifting the focal point was due to objections from the government of Maharashtra, as there would have been more submergence in the neighbouring state, had we followed the old plans,” he said. A former irrigation depart-

ment official who worked with the previous government said that the Chaprala Wildlife Sanctuary is located near the Pranahita Chevella project, due to which its scope was limited.

“The storage capacity for the project in that area was reduced because of the sanctuary and other objections. So after expanding the project, the whole thing was divided into two parts, the other being Kaleshwaram, which is what the entire project is named after,” the former official added. KCR would not have wanted the erstwhile Andhra Pradesh or Congress government’s stamp on the project, which is why he most likely renamed it. However, beyond the technical issues, it is a fact that farmers in the state are now receiving more water.

The entire idea of the project is to avoid water wastage. The geniuses in the current government must understand that public projects like this simply cannot be junked.

Importance of moral Education

Moral education is important in the world for several key reasons, all of which contribute to the well-being of individuals, communities, and societies at large. It helps individuals understand the values of empathy, respect, fairness, and justice. By learning these principles, people are more likely to cooperate, resolve conflicts peacefully, and work together for common goals. People who are morally educated tend to care more about the welfare of others, promoting humanitarian behaviors such as helping those in need. In a globalized world with increasingly diverse populations, moral education promotes respect for human rights and cultural diversity. Understanding that all people deserve dignity and respect regardless of their background, nationality, or beliefs is crucial for fostering peaceful international relations and creating inclusive societies. It helps individuals appreciate the interconnectedness of all people, encouraging tolerance and acceptance of differences. In democratic societies, moral education plays a crucial role in ensuring that citizens understand and value the principles of democracy, such as equality, justice, and the rule of law. Educated citizens are more likely to actively engage in civic life, vote responsibly, and hold their governments accountable. It also helps develop a sense of responsibility toward society, encouraging individuals to participate in social and political processes that contribute to the good socially. Many of the moral issues facing the world today, such as climate change, economic inequality, and global health crises require collective action based on shared moral values. Moral education encourages people to think about the long-term consequences of their actions on the environment, future generations, and global communities.

The connection between ancient Indian education and moral values is deeply inter-twisted, as traditional Indian educational systems were not only focused on academic knowledge but also emphasized the development of character, virtue, and the cultivation of ethical conduct. Education in ancient India was holistic, aiming to shape the whole person, body, mind, and spirit.

The Vedas, which form the foundation of ancient Indian knowledge, were not just religious texts but comprehensive guides for living ethically and responsibly. They laid the groundwork for the understanding of Dharma (righteousness or moral order), which was central to all aspects of life. Education in ancient India was closely tied to Dharma, which included not just ritual practices but also ethical principles of right action, truth, and social responsibility. Students were taught to follow the principles of non-violence, truthfulness, non-stealing, and Brahmacharya (self-control). The study of the Vedas, Upanishads, and other scriptures often involved moral reflection, where students were taught to contemplate their duties to family, society, and the universe.

In ancient India, the Gurukul system was the primary mode of education, where students lived with a guru (teacher) and were taught not just knowledge but also values and ethical principles. The relationship between the guru and the students was often seen as sacred, based on mutual respect and devotion. The guru-shishya (teacher-student) relationship emphasized the transmission of moral values, such as honesty, integrity, gratitude, and humility. Students learned to treat their teacher with reverence and were expected to embody the virtues taught by the guru in their daily lives. The Gurukul system placed a strong emphasis on the development of personal character. It taught students to act responsibly, to serve their community, and to practice self-discipline and ethical conduct in every aspect of life.

The Mahabharata and Ramayana, two of the most important epics in ancient India, played a significant role in moral education. These epics are filled with stories that impart moral lessons about duty, righteousness, selflessness, sacrifice, and the consequences of actions. For instance, the Bhagavad Gita, part of the Mahabharata, is a dialogue between Arjuna and Lord Krishna, where Arjuna is taught about the nature of duty, the importance of selfless action, and how to act in accordance with righteousness even in the face of personal dilemmas. The Gita serves as a profound text on moral philosophy and ethical decision-making. Similarly, in the Ramayana, Lord Rama’s life serves as an ideal of moral behavior from his commitment to truth and justice to his unwavering adherence to dharma, even at great personal cost. For example, Yoga philosophy, which focuses on spiritual discipline, self-control, and mental purity, teaches moral values such as Ahimsa, Satya, and Asteya as foundational principles in the Yamas and Niyamas (ethical guidelines for life). These principles encouraged individuals to live ethically, be compassionate toward others, and cultivate a disciplined life. The Vedanta philosophy, particularly the teachings of Shankaracharya, emphasized the realization of the Self (Atman) as one with the Supreme Reality (Brahman), leading to a life of detachment, moral conduct, and service to other. The Upanishads, the philosophical texts that follow the Vedas, delve deeply into the nature of existence and the relationship between the individual soul (Atman) and the universal soul (Brahman). They also emphasize the importance of moral purification and self-discipline in attaining spiritual enlightenment. The Upanishads encourage introspection and self-awareness, promoting the cultivation of virtues like contentment, non-attachment, and truthfulness as essential for spiritual growth and ethical living.

In ancient Indian education, the concept of Samskara (moral conditioning or spiritual rites) was integral. Samskaras were rites of passage or rituals designed to imbue individuals with moral values and ethical behavior at key stages in their life. These rituals were believed to purify the mind and body, ensuring that individuals grow into morally responsible and spiritually aware members of society. They helped reinforce the values of respect, discipline, responsibility, and empathy. Ancient Indian culture used stories, fables, and parables to impart moral lessons. For instance, the Panchatantra—a collection of animal fables—was specifically designed to teach wisdom and moral behavior to young minds. Each story in the Panchatantra revolves around ethical dilemmas, illustrating the consequences of good and bad actions.

These stories are often used to teach virtues like honesty, courage, loyalty, and prudence, providing young learners with practical examples of how to navigate moral challenges in everyday life. In ancient India, education was seen not just as a means for personal advancement but as a way of preparing individuals to serve society and uphold moral duties. The concept of Lokasamgraha (the well-being of the world) and Seva (service) was emphasized, encouraging students to think beyond their own interests and contribute to the welfare of others. Moral education in this context was linked to the idea that personal spiritual progress could not be achieved without fulfilling one’s social duties and contributing to the greater good. In ancient India, education was not just about acquiring knowledge; it was deeply rooted in the cultivation of moral values, ethical principles, and spiritual wisdom. Whether through the study of sacred texts, philosophical teachings, the Gurukul system, or stories and parables, ancient Indian education sought to develop individuals who were not only wise but also virtuous, compassionate, and responsible members of society.

"This initiative will empower critical sectors such as health-care, education, agriculture,

and governance, delivering region-specific AI solutions that understand and serve every Indian," said Dr. Singh.

Recalling a success story from his own constituency, Dr. Jitendra Singh spoke about AI-powered telemedicine services where an AI doctor communicates fluently in the patient's native language. "It not only builds trust but has a placebo-like psychological effect, enabling better care in remote regions connected with superspecialty hospitals across India," he noted.

Dr. Jitendra Singh emphasized that BharatGen aligns with Prime Minister Narendra Modi's vision of "India's Techade"—not just for innovation but for inclusion. He hailed India's AI progress as a global benchmark, including CPGRAMS, now studied by several countries as a model grievance redressal system.

The Minister reiterated that Anusandhan NRF will further boost India's R&D and innovation ecosystem, and highlighted the ongoing transformation through flagship schemes like PM MUDRA Yojana, PM SVANidhi, and PM Vishwakarma Yojana, which uplift street vendors, artisans, and micro-entrepreneurs.

Dr. Jitendra Singh highlighted the transformative role of Generative AI in grassroots governance, citing the integration of multilingual feedback systems into platforms like CPGRAMS to enhance citizen engagement and grievance redressal.

"Agriculture Minister is, first and foremost, the chief servant of the farmers.": Shivraj Singh



New Delhi, July 6 (GNS): As part of the ongoing 'Viksit Krishi Sankalp Abhiyan', Union Minister of Agriculture and Farmers' Welfare, Shri Shivraj Singh Chouhan, on the fifth day of the campaign, interacted with farmers at the Krishi Vigyan Kendra in Pipra-kothi, East Champaran, Bihar. In his continued efforts of interacting with the farmers from Odisha, Jammu, Haryana, and Uttar Pradesh, Shri Chouhan engaged with the farming community of Bihar today.

Addressing the gathering, the Minister described Pipra-kothi in East Champaran as a sacred land, emphasizing that it was from this very soil that Mahatma Gandhi delivered his profound message of Satyagraha and non-violence to the world. He expressed deep reverence for the region and said that under the ideals of Mahatma Gandhi and the leadership of Prime Minister Narendra Modi, several initiatives, including the establishment of a Krishi Vigyan Kendra, have contributed to agricultural advancement here. He recalled how this very land became a battleground for justice when the British oppressed local farmers and how Gandhiji's movement from here laid the foundation for India's freedom struggle.

Chouhan emphasized that the true meaning of an Agriculture Minister is to be the foremost servant of farmers. Agriculture is

the backbone of the Indian economy, and farmers are its soul. He stated that the Prime Minister's vision of a developed India can only be realized through developed agriculture and prosperous farmers, and collective effort is essential in this mission. During the visit, he interacted specifically with litchi growers who raised concerns about the fruit perishing within 48 hours, resulting in losses. He assured them that the government would take concrete steps to address the issue and directed ICAR scientists to conduct research to develop techniques that extend the shelf life of litchis so that farmers receive fair prices. He also spoke about increasing the number of cold storage facilities to support this effort.

Chouhan highlighted that due to the Prime Minister's effective policies, maize cultivation in Bihar has surged. With the introduction of ethanol production, the demand and prices for maize have increased. Where maize once sold for 1200–1500 per quintal, prices have now gone up significantly. Yields have also improved—from 23–24 quintals per hectare earlier to 50–60 quintals per hectare now.

He also instructed scientists to conduct research and develop improved seed varieties for both Basmati and other rice types to further enhance yields. Despite owning small plots of land, Bihar's farmers are, he

said, producing gold from the soil. He shared that two new rice varieties have recently been developed through research that require 20% less water and a 30% increase in yield.

Reaffirming the government's commitment to boosting crop production in Bihar under the leadership of Prime Minister Modi, Shri Chouhan stressed the need for not only increasing grain output but also focusing on fruits, vegetables, and flowers to ensure that all 1.45 billion citizens have access to sufficient food. He condemned the recent terrorist attack in Pahalgam and noted that under Prime Minister Modi's leadership, India responded strongly by destroying terrorist camps in just 25 minutes, forcing Pakistan to retreat within three days. He added that the Indus Waters Treaty, which had previously allocated 80% of river water to Pakistan, has been annulled, and India has declared firmly that "blood and water cannot flow together." Indian water is for Indian farmers.

Addressing concerns over counterfeit pesticides, he asserted that strict action will be taken against companies producing fake agrochemicals. No one will be spared, he assured. Shri Chouhan said that 'Viksit Krishi Sankalp Abhiyan' is an initiative to create miracles in agriculture and to bridge the gap between research labs and agricultural fields. Under the campaign,

Revanth Reddy Directs Fast-Track Tourism Infrastructure Development in Telangana

Emphasising eco-tourism, he directed that For-

est Department lands within the Core Urban Region (CURE) be developed jointly by the Forest and Tourism Departments. He also called for the creation of eco-parks within Hyderabad on the lines of Gurramguda Eco Park and instructed that forest lands in the proposed Future City be developed to international standards through urban forest models. A special officer should be appointed to speed up the implementation of urban forest projects, he said. The Chief Minister further directed officials

to develop the heritage bridges at Puranapul into tourist attractions by creating visitor amenities and examining the feasibility of diverting traffic to enhance the tourist experience.

Reviewing preparations for the proposed Global Investment Summit scheduled for December, Revanth Reddy instructed officials to begin groundwork immediately and constitute inter-departmental committees to ensure effective coordination and smooth conduct of the event, according to an official statement.

Minister Jupally directed that petitioners be called to the office and that all concerned officials—from the Village Panchayat Officer (GPO), Revenue Inspector, Deputy Tahsildar, Tahsildar, Survey officials to RDO office staff—sit together to examine each case. He instructed officials to decide responsibilities on the spot, record necessary reports and ensure time-bound action.

The Minister categorically stated that *not a single file that can be resolved at the divisional level should remain pending*. Cases requiring the District Collector's approval must be forwarded the same day with complete records and recommendations.

He also directed officials to prepare a clear action plan for every pending file, specifying its current status, the reason for delay, the officer responsible, the next course of action and the deadline for disposal.

Ponnam demands BJP apology over alleged Ram Mandir fund scam



Hyderabad, July 6 (GNS) Telangana's minister for transport and backward classes welfare Ponnam Prabhakar on Monday demanded the BJP to apologise to people of the country for embezzlement of crores of rupees in Ayodhya Ram Mandir. He accused the BJP of using the name of god and 'akshintalu' (grains laced with turmeric) for politics. Talking to media persons, the Congress leader recalled that former Prime Minister Rajiv Gandhi laid the foundation stone for the construction of the Ram Janmabhoomi temple in Ayodhya. He said many people across India contributed donations for the Ram

Mandir in Ayodhya.

He claimed that theft of funds from the Ram Janmabhoomi temple in Ayodhya is an insult to all Hindus. "It was a scam committed in the name of god. The BJP is the party that used the name of god for scam." The Congress leader said the BJP, which sought votes in the name of Ram and 'akshintalu', was defeated by the people of Ayodhya. He claimed that the people of Ayodhya were the first to notice corruption in the Ayodhya Ram Mandir.

He demanded that the BJP respond to the allegations of embezzlement of funds and apologise to the people. "They looted the donation

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CEO Reviews SIR Progress, Directs 100% Enumeration Form Distribution

Hyderabad, July 6 (GNS) State Chief Electoral Officer (CEO) Sri C. Sudarshan Reddy (IAS), along with Additional CEO Vasam Venkateswarlu Reddy (IAS), held a video conference with District Collectors on Monday to review the progress of the SIR (Special Intensive Revision) process.

During the meeting, he reviewed the ongoing distribution of enumeration forms across the state. He directed the Collectors to ensure that the distribution process is completed without fail by Tuesday, July 7, 2026. He specifically urged Collectors of Hyderabad, Medchal, and Ranga Reddy districts, as well as those overseeing urban areas, to pay special

attention to this matter and ensure 100% distribution of the enumeration forms.

He emphasized the crucial role supervisors must play in the filling of enumeration forms. He instructed supervisors to identify areas where Booth Level Officers (BLOs) might be struggling and to assist them in the form-filling process. He also suggested identifying local

volunteers to help voters fill out the forms. Collectors were directed to publicize the phone numbers of the respective supervisors through the media.

The CEO instructed Collectors to set up additional help desks wherever necessary, in addition to the 16 help desks already operational in Hyderabad. He further directed that completed

enumeration forms must bear the signatures of both the voter and the BLO, and must include the required photographs. He directed EROs and AEROs to undertake extensive field visits and take measures to accelerate the survey process. He also instructed that the digitization process for completed enumeration forms be initiated.

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
